With 10,015 planes for the Army and Navy in production, on contract or being built under "letters of intention," the President last week indicated that airplane production is making as good progress as possible under the circumstances. The Chief Executive made it plain that what ever the program lacked in speed is due to delays by Congress in passing the \$5,000,000,000 arms appropriation bill, the excess profits tax bill and the selective service bill.

The President pointed out that the Government is especially interested in training pilots, which requires the production of many planes and in increasing the capacity of the country to build airplanes. Figures already published show that this country has the capacity of 10,000 planes a year; that this will be increased to 13,000 or 14,000 by January first, and reach 36,000 per year early in 1942. said he could not order many planes until the appropriation bill, passed by the House and last week pending in the Senate, had been passed.

The Joint Permanent Defense Board, set up by the United States and Canada, last week sent representatives of the armed services on an airplane tour of the key defense points along the Canadian eastern coast. It is expected that a report of the commission will be available by the middle of this month but whether its contents will be made public remains doubtful. 
