

HERTFORD INDIANS TAKE GAME FROM CRADLE COLONY BOYS TO EVEN THINGS UP

Led By Berry and Fuller, Local Warriors Pin Edenton Colonials 9-2

The Hertford Indians scalped the Edenton Colonials 9-2 on Hicks Field in Edenton Sunday afternoon. Berry and Fuller, chunking for the Indians held the Colonials to six scattered hits while the braves chalked up 11 hits for themselves.

This was the second battle of the Indians and the Colonials this season and in the first encounter the Colonials swept the redmen aside with a score of ten to two. The tally is even now with the scores almost identical.

The Cradle Colony boys made themselves satisfied with only three hits in the first seven stanzas while the Indians, led by Chub Goodman of high school fame, and Dave Fuller, the new coach forged ahead to make nine runs on the 11 hits. The Colonial gentlemen came through in the eighth frame to make two hits and their two runs. Charles Wales, Edenton twirler, held the warriors to no hits and no runs in the final three innings.

The sixth was the round in which the Indians overwhelmed the Colonials by making five hits and six

runs. Goodman led the batting for Hertford, making three out of five trips to the plate with a double and a triple; Fuller was next best with two out of five.

Ambrose, leading batsman for the Colonials, made three hits out of four trips.

Crabtree and Forehand made the only runs for the Colonials, scoring when Wheeler hit a double into left field while two men were already out.

The batteries: Colonials—Crabtree and Wales, pitchers; Wheeler, catcher. Hertford—Berry and Fuller; Judy Thatch, catcher.

Growers Now Seeding Winter Cover Crops

With tobacco moving to market and cotton being picked for ginning, North Carolina farmers are devoting many of their few spare moments to the seeding of winter cover crops, says E. C. Blair, extension agronomist of State College.

Largely through the AAA grant-of-aid program which enables growers to secure certain seed without cost at planting time, the acreage devoted to these winter legumes and grasses has increased steadily during the past few years.

One of the main objectives in growing winter cover crops is to increase soil fertility, Blair explained.

To get the maximum benefit in soil improvement, the whole crop should be turned under at such a time and in such a manner as to allow the crop to decay in time to do the most good for the crop that follows.

However, Blair said, many cover crops may be grazed to a limited extent, but grazing must be discontinued in time for the crop to mature for grain or seed. If the crop is to be used for grazing, it is essential that it be planted early enough in the fall to make a satisfactory growth before cold weather.

On the average farm, the State College agronomist pointed out, there is usually a need for winter feed and an early fall crop of hay or grain to supplement the hay and grain crops of the fall just past. There is also a need for green feed during the winter to increase the supply of milk for the family and to graze other livestock.

Winter cover crops may be used in four ways: turned under for soil improvement; grazed for a limited time, allowed to reach the hay stage and cut for hay; grazed for a limited time, allowed to mature, and used for grain and seed; and grazed to their full capacity as a part of the farm feeding system.

AN ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE OF \$2,000.00 BONDS OF THE TOWN OF HERTFORD, NORTH CAROLINA, FOR FIRE EQUIPMENT

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Hertford as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act, 1921, of North Carolina, as amended, negotiable bonds of the Town of Hertford, North Carolina, are hereby authorized to be issued in an aggregate amount not exceeding \$2,000 for the purpose of purchasing fire fighting equipment.

Section 2. A tax sufficient to pay the principal and interest on said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 3. A statement of debt of the Town of Hertford has been filed with the Town Clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect thirty (30) days after its first publication unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is filed under the Municipal Finance Act, 1921, and in such event it shall take effect when approved by the voters at an election as provided in such act.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 3rd day of September, 1940, and was first published on the 6th day of September, 1940.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty (30) days after its first publication.


