Guests at the club meeting Tuesday were Jimmie McCallum, director of the Perquimans band, and C. L. McCullers, director of the Edenton band. McCullers was high in his praise of the part the Hertford band played in the Armistice Day parade in Edenton.

Both band directors answered questions for the club members in regards to various types of uniforms available and McCallum suggested that uniforms be provided as soon as possible for at least eighteen members of the band and additional uniforms for the remainder of the thirty band students as they progressed in the work.


