

NEA Raising Funds To Send Members To Tuskegee Institute

New Farmers of America of the Perquimans County Training School chapter are working to raise funds with which to send a representative to the Tuskegee Institute National Leadership School for New Farmers of America, the national organization of Negro boys studying vocational agriculture.

According to an announcement released by S. B. Simmons, Executive secretary of the organization, Greensboro, the school will be conducted from February 10 to 15. It is under the supervision of W. N. Elam of the U. S. office of Education, Washington, D. C.; J. R. Thomas, National Advisor, Virginia State College, Petersburg; J. W. Warren, Spring Hope, national president.

President LaFoy Hayes of the North Carolina Association, hopes to send at least five representatives from North Carolina. Funds with which to make the trip are to be raised by local chapters. The four chapters selling the largest number of N. F. A. Leadership tickets, or raising the largest amount, will be

permitted to select their representative to make the trip. Prof. K. A. Williams, teacher of vocational agriculture in the Perquimans Training School, and President H. Fred Simons of the local chapter, are making the citizens to cooperate with the New Farmers in this effort.

Radio Stars Will Perform At Central Grammar School

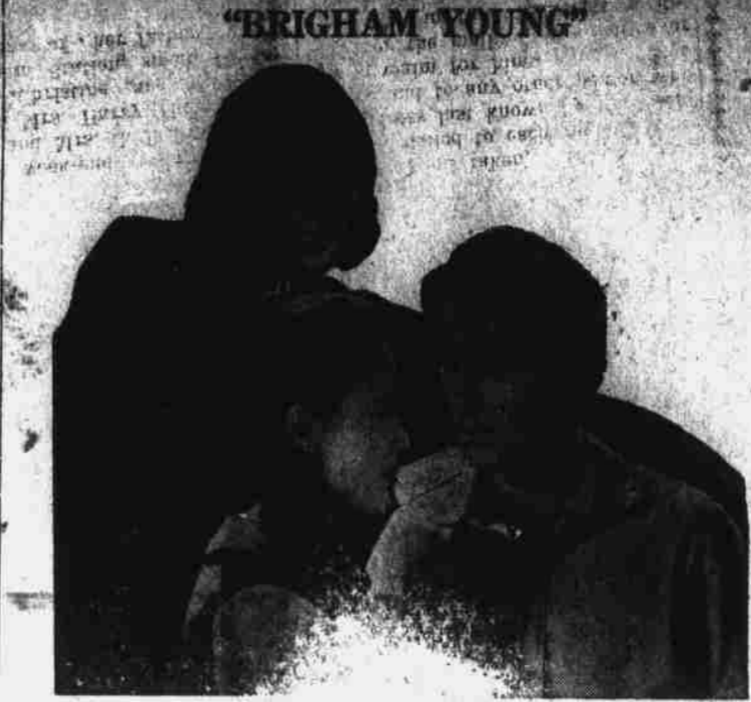
Sunshine Sue and her Radio Gang will appear on the stage of the Perquimans County Central Grammar School on Thursday, November 21, at 8 p. m.

ed shall constitute notice to the registrant and all concerned. This is true whether or not the mailed notice is actually received by the person to whom it is addressed. Any person required by law to register, or any registrant, who fails to perform a duty required by the Selective Training and Service Act of 1940, within the time provided by the law (generally five days) has violated the law. A person violating the law is subject to trial in the United States District Court, which may impose a fine or imprisonment, or both. The date when action was taken by the Local Board will be written in the Classification Record in each

of the following instances: Whenever a duty is to be performed by a registrant. Whenever a period of time begins to run within which a registrant is to perform a duty. Whenever a period of time begins to run within which a registrant may claim a privilege. All registrants and other persons concerned should examine from time to time the notices posted by the Local Board and the Classification Board. Notice To Registrars And To The Public

The Selective Service Regulations provide: Making a Questionnaire (Form 40) by the Local Board to the registrant is notice that the process of "classification and selection" with regard to that registrant has begun. Each day this Local Board will post at its office a notice of the order numbers of the registrants to whom Questionnaires have been mailed that day.

This Local Board keeps in its office a Classification Record (Form 100). On this Classification Record will be entered the date each action is taken by this Board or the Board of Appeal concerning each registrant. The entry of this date in the Classification Record is notice of the action taken. Other notices will be mailed to each registrant at his address last known by the Local Board, and to any other person who files a claim for him.

Either the mailing of a notice of the entry in the Classification Record or the date the notice was mailed
