Mr. Anderson stated that in 1934 approximately 4.4 miles of Rural that time the figure has jumped to more than 45 miles of wire. This total does not include the distances of private extensions.

Approximately twenty percent of the rural homes in Perquimans are the rural homes in Perquimans are now served with electric current as the results of the Bural Electrifica. Out Of School Boys the results of the Rural Electrification program. This total numbers about 200 homes.

In a brief summary of the estab lishment of the various lines built during the past five years, Mr. Anderson said that in 1935 a line was set at Chapanoke and was 2.7 miles long. In 1936 a Belvidere line was set and this was'9 miles long. The New Hope project was built in 1937 and was 10.6 miles of line.

The section along the Edenton en service during 1988 and this line was 3.6 milles long. No lines were built in 1989.

During 1940 the program expanded to build the Belvidere-Sandy Ridge Road line, 2.7 miles; a line was built from Jackson's store to the County Home, which was 3.9 miles and the new line just finished from Belvidere to Whiteston is 8.5 miles long. During 1941 it is hoped that new lines may be built from George Rid-dick's store to Bethel and from Bel-videre to Gordon's Mill.
