Perquimans Farmers Receive Checks For Farm Program Work

Three hundred and nineteen checks. drawn for a sum of \$9,102.09 have been received by Perquimans County farmers to date for their compliance with the 1940 Farm Program.

These figures were released by L. W. Anderson, County Farm Agent, who stated checks are for smaller sums this year, in many cases, due to deductions made for the purchase of Austrian winter peas and lime ordered last year.

Those farmers who ordered peas and lime last year had the amount charged against their conservation payments which they are now receiving.

Mr. Anderson stated that in 1940 local farmers bought a total of 100,-000 pounds of Austrian winter peas and 2,158 tons of lime.

All 1940 applications have been filed with the State office, and checks will soon be received by the other 1,200 farmers in the county who complied with the farm program.
