

Four Master Farm Families Selected

Four "Master Farm Families" in North Carolina have been selected by the Progressive Farmer and the N. C. State College Extension Service. Two others, one in the mountain section and another in the southwestern section of the State, will be chosen shortly.

From literally hundreds of nominees, the judges selected, after much study and deliberation, the families of W. H. Blalock of Wilson County, P. E. Burch of Surry County, Bill Hooks of Columbus County, and Geo. Sockwell of Guilford County.

To be named as a "Master Farm Family" is one of the greatest honors that can come to rural people. The Progressive Farmer enlists the cooperation of the Extension Services in the states where the magazine is circulated to select Farm Families periodically—about every three years.

Mr. and Mrs. Blalock and their three children—Doris, 19; Carlton, 15; and Sara Ann, 6—own a 212-acre farm in the Black Creek community of Wilson County. Mr. and Mrs. Burch own a 260-acre farm in the Mountain Park section of Surry, and they have two children: Phillip, 19, and Nell, 13. Mr. and Mrs. Bill Hooks have four children: Harris, 18; Eugene, 16; Mazelle, 14, and Billie, 12. Their address is Whiteville, Route 1, and they own a 264-acre farm. The Sockwells have a 409-acre farm on Elon College, Route 1. Their two children are Marion, 13, and Ruth, 12.

Outstanding on every farm is a diversified agriculture, including livestock and poultry to supplement cash crops. Stress is also placed on adequate food for the family. Each family has a year-round garden.

Crop yields on these four farms are well above the county averages, and livestock and poultry are managed to insure high production on an economical basis.

Jailing Children Still Continuing

Wade N. Cashion, director of institutions for the State Welfare Department, this week called attention to the fact that several counties in North Carolina are continuing the practice of jailing children under 16 years of age despite the attorney general's ruling that such incarcerations are unlawful.

Citing figures for the last six months of 1940 and for January of this year, Cashion placed the number of child incarcerations as far too high when 31 jails in January held 80 children under 16 years, 12 of the number being less than 12 years.

Back in September of last year, 32 jails reported a population of exactly 100 children and during the last half of 1940 the figures showed a total of 471 children in county lock-ups.

"People in the counties concerned should make all possible effort to bring about a change in such a situation because it is the offspring of some of their own neighbors who are meeting the detrimental contacts of association with hardened law-breakers," Cashion said.

"The time these boys and girls of both races spend inside jail walls varies from a single day to a whole month and more in some cases. The charges against them are listed in different categories running from 'investigation' to 'forgery'."

Last month Macon and Edgecombe counties each held a 13-year-old Negro boy for "forgery."

Buncombe and Richmond counties in January listed 11-year-old white boys as jailed for "investigation."

Many times, Cashion said, a young child is sent to jail along with its mother because of no other facility of child-care. In January, 19 white boys, five white girls, 53 Negro boys and five Negro girls made up the 80 total population of county jails who were 16 years and under.

Eight children were held in Buncombe and Wilson; six in Nash, five in Craven; four in Burke, Cleveland, Pitt, and three in Caldwell, Lee, Martin, Richmond, Scotland and Wilkes, two in Cabarrus, Catawba, Edgecombe, Halifax, and Madison; one in Alamance, Anson, Guilford, Henderson, Hertford, Johnston, Macon, Pender, Rockingham, Rutherford, Surry, Wayne and Wake.

Cost Of Home-Made Lamp Brooder Is Low

Poultry is a good "defense-period" farm enterprise due to increased demand for chickens and eggs. C. F. Parrish, Extension poultry specialist, of N. C. State College, says that the farm family who formerly raised a few chicks with hens will find a home-made lamp brooder an economical device for expanding poultry production.

The approximate cost of building a home-made lamp brooder varies from \$5.00 to \$7.50, and it will accommodate 50 to 60 chicks. It is of simple construction, easy to operate, and is heated by one to three lamps, depending upon the severity of the weather.

Parrish invites farm people to write to the Extension Poultry Office at N. C. State College, Raleigh, for a copy of Blue Print No. 46, which gives detailed directions for building a lamp brooder. Most county farm and home agents of the Extension Service also have copies of this blueprint on file in their office. The blueprints are free, from either source.

In discussing the home-made lamp brooder, the Extension poultryman said: "It is intended that this brooder be operated in a protected place, possibly under a wood shed, a wagon shed, or in some similar place, preferably where the wind will not blow directly on the brooder, yet the sun will shine directly on the sun porch."

"The brooder is constructed of two parts. The bottom section houses the lamps; the top section accommodates the baby chicks. The tray that separates the top section from the bottom section is covered with 26 to 28 gauge tin. The top part of the tray is covered with one inch or more of sharp, coarse, dry sand."

New Publication Issued; Revise Poultry Circular

From the office of the Agricultural Editor at N. C. State College comes the announcement that an Extension Circular (No. 248) has been published on "Lettuce Growing in North Carolina," and that Extension Circular No. 156, "How to Cull Poultry Flocks," has been revised.

These publications are free upon request, by name and number, to the Agricultural Editor, State College, Raleigh. A list of other Extension and Experiment Station publications at State College will also be furnished free to citizens of North Carolina.

The lettuce circular was prepared by Robert Schmidt, associate horticulturist, and it points out the need for research work to develop better varieties before the commercial lettuce acreage in North Carolina can be expanded. However, Schmidt sees an opportunity to develop a good home market for lettuce, especially in the mountain area.

Climatic, soil and fertilizer requirements of the lettuce are analyzed, together with information about adapted varieties, seeds and plants, preparation and planting, culture, harvesting and marketing, and disease and insect control.

C. F. Parrish, C. J. Maupin, and T. T. Brown, Extension poultrymen, brought the information in the poultry culling circular up to date. A larger type was used in printing the pamphlet to make it more easily read.

A "Summer Culling Guide" is one of the features of the publication, and it lists the difference between good and poor laying birds.
