

Scott Reviews Farm Statutes

Strengthening of regulatory and inspection laws and the enactment of marketing legislation to further bolster the farmers' incomes were paramount contributions of the 1941 General Assembly to the betterment of agricultural conditions in North Carolina, Commissioner Agriculture W. Kerr Scott said today.

In addition to legislation affecting the State Department of Agriculture, Commissioner Scott said the Legislature "made substantial and needed contributions in the field of agricultural research."

"Rejuvenation of North Carolina's fertilizer and seed laws, creation of a marketing 'authority,' legislation to assure dairy farmers they will be paid for their milk on the basis of classification and use, establishment of a trade mark for farm products, and acts to protect the State's growing livestock industry were among the outstanding agricultural enactments," he added.

"Reduction of the cost of farm truck licenses will also be remembered as agricultural legislation of considerable benefit to the farmers."

Commissioner Scott summarized agricultural legislation, affecting regulatory, inspection, control and marketing features of the Department's program, as follows:

FERTILIZER LAW—A revitalized act with provisions (1) to enable the farmer to distinguish low grade from high grade fertilizer, (2) requiring that "low grade" be stamped on low grade goods, (3) providing a tightening of penalty provisions to assure more accurate guarantees of plant food, (4) reducing the number of grades to be sold "not to exceed 50" and (5) placing greater emphasis of the use of recommended grades of fertilizer.

SEED LAW—Another revitalized act, second to none in the Nation insofar as protection to the farmers and honest dealers is concerned. The law is in conformity with the Federal Seed Act, which is essential since a large proportion of seed purchased move in inter-state commerce. Responsibility for correct labeling of seed sold under the law is placed upon the person making the guarantee as to purity and germination. Responsibility for the procurement of the inspection stamp \$1 for each 72 dozen packages or fraction thereof (for vegetable and flower seed) is placed on the wholesale merchant or shipper of package seed. In addition to streamlining the law which was first enacted in 1909, the Board of Agriculture is given authority to adopt rules and regulations that may become necessary when other noxious and injurious seeds become a menace to the agriculture of the State.

MILK AUDITING LAW—Dairy farmers and distributors are given equal protection under a new law that permits the Department to check on the quantity and classification under which milk is sold. The Department is given the authority to audit the records of plants to determine whether the farmer is paid for his milk on the basis of usage. This law protects the producer as well as the distributor in assuring fair practices in the classification and use of milk, and will result in greater confidence between producers and distributors.

MARKETING AUTHORITY—An act to promote, encourage and develop a program of orderly marketing of farm products; provide supervision, and control of marketing centers that may be established in cooperation with governmental units; give authority to the Department in the furtherance of marketing; such as planning, entering into federal agreements and other agreements necessary in establishing wholesale markets; to create a marketing authority consisting of the Board of Agriculture and the Commissioner and further authorize issuance of bonds to equip market warehouses when necessary.

REGULATION OF UNFAIR PRACTICES BY HANDLERS OF FARM PRODUCTS—An act designed primarily to protect truck growers of eastern Carolina who make contracts with out-of-State firms for the production of cucumbers, tomatoes and other crops, with provisions requiring contracting firms to give sufficient and satisfactory evidence of their ability to carry out their contract, or furnish a bond to protect the growers who have incurred considerable expense in producing the particular crop.

QUALITY TRADE MARK—An act establishing "Tar Heel" as the official name to designate farm products. A farmer or packer desiring to use the trade mark must first make application to the Department, giving full information as to its intended use, and if requirements are met—including quality, condition and grade standards prescribed by the Board of Agriculture—the applicant would be licensed. After an applicant is licensed to use the trade mark, the Department would have authority to make inspections to assure that privileges prescribed under the act are not abused.

SWINE DISEASE LAW—An act to regulate the movement of hogs into the State and to require a certificate of health unless they are

consigned for slaughter or to a market operating under the Department. This act is intended to break up the practice of peddlers bringing in diseased hogs and selling them to the farmers.

LIVESTOCK MARKET LAW—An act to supervise and regulate public livestock markets and to control diseases of livestock. This provides for such markets to secure a permit from the Commissioner of Agriculture; requires a bond of \$2,000 to guarantee the payment for livestock sold; requires cleaning and disinfecting of such markets; provides that cattle and hogs must have a certificate of health if they are bought by farmers for breeding or feeding purposes; prohibits the sale or transportation of diseased animals except for immediate slaughter only; and authorizes the Board of Agriculture to make necessary regulations.

BANT'S DISEASE AND T. B.—The General Appropriation bill provides indemnity for farmers whose cattle are slaughtered on account of Bant's Disease or T. B.

JAPANESE BEETLE—Funds were provided by the General Assembly to combat the Japanese beetle, enemy of 300 or more agricultural plants.

WAREHOUSE STORAGE—Storage of commodities, other than cotton is permitted under the State warehouse system. Issuance of negotiable "State guaranteed receipts" is permitted.

TIME AND LAND PLASTER LAW—An act to require registration of all agricultural liming materials, including agricultural liming material with potash and land plaster, together with requirements for labeling and guaranteed analysis as to soil neutralizing value, calcium and magnesium content and "screen" analysis.

Safety Talks

"Persons who seek to excuse the recent increase in traffic accidents in North Carolina on the grounds that national defense activity in various sections of the State has created abnormal traffic situations are kidding themselves," Ronald Hocutt, director of the Highway Safety Division, stated this week.

In reply to an inquiry from the National Safety Council, which is making a survey to determine the importance of national defense accidents in the national traffic accident picture, Hocutt said:

"In my opinion, and on the basis of our accident records, the traffic volume resulting from defense activities at Fort Bragg, Camp Davis and other points in the State has been a minor factor in the accident picture in North Carolina.

"As a matter of record, during the first two months of this year there was only one traffic death in North Carolina in which a military vehicle was involved; there were three deaths in motor vehicle accidents involving military personnel but not military vehicles; and there were eight deaths in motor vehicle accidents arising out of defense production."

"In other words," he said, "only 12 of the 175 traffic deaths in the State during January and February, could be attributed to national defense activity. In view of the heavy volume of traffic occasioned by the daily commutation of thousands of workers to and from defense projects, and the vast movements of defense materials and personnel over North Carolina highways, this number of fatalities indicates that the defense program is not a great factor in the accident situation in this State."

"The really big factors which brought about a 30 per cent increase in traffic deaths in the State during January and February were carelessness, recklessness, and speed," he concluded. "What we really need in the way of defense is a greater number of drivers who are interested in the defense of the lives of travelers on our roads."
