

U. S. Coast Guard Raises Age Limit

The United States Coast Guard is now accepting applications for enlistment, from young men between the ages of 18 and 28 years. Applicants must be citizens of the United States, of good moral character and meet the physical and educational requirements.

Base pay for original enlistments is \$21 per month and usually increases to \$36 per month at the end of 4 months in a training school. The average boy is advanced to \$54 per month usually after the end of his first year of service. Each man on his first enlistment is given \$112.75 clothing bounty allowance for uniforms, etc. Enlistments are made for a period of three years.

Schools are maintained to teach approximately 25 different trades and every man is encouraged to study some specific trade, which will give him an opportunity for broader, general and professional education.

Each man is granted thirty days' leave of absence with pay each year and shore leave for a brief period not to exceed forty-eight hours. Free

medical attention is provided for members of the service.

Summary State Laws Available To County And City Officials

The Institute of Government at Chapel Hill has released this week a comprehensive summary, interpretation and analysis of the principal State-wide laws passed by the 1941 General Assembly, Albert Coates, director of the Institute, announced this week.

This study, copies of which will be available to Chowan County and city officials, is the culmination of the daily legislative bulletin service rendered to cities and counties by the staff of the Institute during the recent session of the legislature.

Among the topics dealt with in detail, against the background of research by the Institute during and since the session, will be legislation concerning taxation, finance, public health and safety, public schools, conservation and development, and many others. Supplemented by recent Supreme Court decisions and rulings of the Attorney General, the publication will treat with matters of both local and state-wide governmental importance.
