# **County Defense Bond Committee Hears About Plan**

Members of the committees in Perquimans County for promotion of Defense Bond sales were addressed by Edward Wayne of Raleigh, secretary of the North Carolina Bankers Association, in a meeting at the Perquimans County Courthouse last Thursday night.

Mr. Wayne outlined the importance of the public buying Defense Bonds and Stamps, and told the group that its task was to explain the benefits of purchasing them and work in an educational line rather than directly solicit sales. This method is believed to be better than setting a quota for each community, he said.

Local committees are to keep the program before the public at all times, and stress the importance of cooperation, which in the opinion of Mr. Wayne, will in a large measure prevent inflation.

"Inflation is sure to come, if this program is not subscribed to," Mr. Mrs. H. C. West. Wayne said. "I believe this to be the soundest investment program the City, spent Sunday with relatives government has ever put before the here. public."

Sale of bonds to date has been reported as good by Secretary of the Treasury Morgenthau, Mr. Wayne said.


