

Recorder's Judge Hears Seven Cases In Long Session

Seven cases were disposed of by Judge Charles Johnson, in a long session Tuesday. Much testimony given in several of the cases prolonged the time consumed in hearing the docket.

Ellis Sutton, Jr., Oscar Hoffer, Shelton Zachary and Elisa Sutton, all Negroes, were tried on a charge of larceny of wood and trespass. Prayer for judgment was continued in the case after Elisa Sutton assumed full responsibility for the actions of the others, and received a warning from the Court not to gather wood from the premises of J. S. McNider, prosecuting witness.

Wilson Ferebee, Negro, was found guilty of assault with a deadly weapon and was sentenced to three months on the roads. A previous suspended sentence of four months was invoked because Ferebee violated the terms of the suspension.

William Bateman was given a 30-day road sentence on two counts

when he was found guilty of being drunk and disorderly and resisting arrest. Sentence was suspended upon payment of a fine of \$50 and costs.

Howard Blanchard, Negro, entered a plea of guilty to larceny and receiving and was given a 30-day road sentence to be suspended upon payment of a fine of \$25 and costs of court.

Mary Etta Webb, Negro, was found guilty of assault with a deadly weapon and using profanity on the streets of Hertford. She was sentenced to jail for 30 days, sentence to be suspended upon payment of costs.

William McClenny was fined \$10 and costs after pleading guilty to driving with improper lights.

Junius Ferebee, Negro, was fined \$25 and costs on a plea of guilty to a charge of speeding.

Judge Johnson announced that Recorder's Court would be in recess next week due to the January Term of Superior Court being in session.

Tax collections for the 1942 levy have reached a new high here, according to Sheriff J. Emmert Winslow, who announced today that some \$43,672.42 had already been collected for this year.

Sheriff Winslow stated this collection is the best in recent years and attributes the good record to the fact that with more money in circulation people are readily paying their taxes.

He warned, however, that beginning February first, a penalty will be invoked on all unpaid taxes and urges people to pay their taxes now in order to avoid this penalty.
