Scarcity of Merchandise Shown By Values Set By OPA

If there was ever any doubt regarding the shortage of food items, or that the Armed forces were to be supplied before civilian consumers received attention, that can be dispelled now by viewing the values placed on canned fruits and vegetables for point rationing which be-
