This payment, Chairman White estimated, will increase returns for farmers who harvested more than 90 percent of their goals. This incentive payment, he added, is applicable only on peanuts harvested for nuts and does not apply to peanuts which are "hog-ged-off." The agricultural conservation payment of \$1.10 per ton will be eliminated this year in view of the incentive payments.
