County, for example, as reported by Assistant County Agent Jessé F. Giles. Since 1936 growers there have spent \$20,425.40 for the construction of terraces. On 915 farms a total of 9,141 acres have been terraced and 328,650 linear feet of farm road have also been constructed.

Weaver says that the average cost of terracing an acre with the Catawacre, with a cost of 52 cents per one hundred feet. Most of this work has been done on small farms where growers have only light equipment and are unable to do the terracing as they wish it carried out.
