

TOWN AND FARM IN WARTIME

Blue Stamps—For Processed Foods
Blue Stamps "K," "L" and "M," continue good through July 7.

Coffee
Stamp No. 24 (1 pound) is good through June 30.

Fuel Oil
Period No. 5 coupons valid in all zones until September 30.

Gasoline
"A" book coupon No. 5, good for three gallons each, must last through July 21.

Shoes
Stamp No. 18 (1 pair) became valid June 16.

Sugar
Coupon No. 13 good for 5 pounds through August 15. Coupons No. 15 and 16 are good through October 31 for 5 pounds each for home canning purposes. Housewives may apply to their local ration boards if necessary.

Red Stamps—For Meats, Etc.
Red Stamps "J," "K," "L," "M," good through June 30. "N" becomes valid June 30.

Coffee By Mail
North Carolina coffee drinkers who order their blends by mail may now "pay" for the purchase by enclosing detached ration stamps with order rather than the entire ration book, OPA has announced. Formerly, consumers were required to forward their War Ration Book to the retailer or wholesaler for removal of stamps.

Ice Box Prices
Retail price ceilings on new ice boxes have been established by OPA by models for North Carolina. Present prices will be lowered in many cases. Three sets of retail ceilings have been provided: (1) Sales by ice companies and their stores, prices ranging from \$26.75 to \$75.00 delivered; (2) Mail order sales—\$18.95 to \$59.96; (3) All other sales at retail—\$31.25 to \$86.50.

More Farm Machinery
A total of 30,000 tons of carbon steel, with other materials in proportion, has been allocated to the farm machinery program for the quarter beginning July 1. An additional 200,000 tons of steel have also been approved for each of the three quarters from October 1, 1943 to July 1, 1944. During the third quarter of this year, special emphasis will be given to the manufacture of harvesting machinery for this year's crops.

The whole farm machinery program has been stepped up.
Inspection Requirements Changed
Tire inspections for North Carolina commercial motor vehicles now may be made every 5,000 miles or every six months, whichever occurs first, ODT says. Previously, commercial vehicles had to have tire inspections every 5,000 miles, or every 60 days, whichever occurred first.

Data On Prisoners
American soldiers officially reported as prisoners of war in enemy countries to date total 17,083, the War Department has announced. Of these, 11,307 are held by Japan; 3,312 by Germany and 2,464 by Italy. However, these reports are incomplete. Information in the hands of the War Department indicates that the basic diet of an American soldier in German prison camps is largely potatoes, cabbage, fish, and an indefinite amount of meat.

Teen-age Boys Solve Farm Labor Shortage

Jerry Padgett, who is only 10 years old, and Robert Herbert, 15, have qualified as expert tractor operators on their fathers' farms in Clay County and have solved a critical labor shortage, says Fred S. Sloan, State program leader for the N. C. State College Extension Service.

He reports that the boys are operating tractors and tractor-drawn machinery like veterans in plowing, harrowing, seeding, and cultivating the crops. When the boys teamed up their fathers decided to do the same thing, and now the two farms are operated as one.

The two owners pooled all of their labor and equipment and found that they had two tractors, a combine, grain drill, lime spreader, a two-row corn planter, cultipacker, two mowing machines and rakes, two disc harrows, one drag harrow, two disc plows, a two-row cultivator, and various other smaller pieces of machinery for the 100 acres of cropland and 75 acres of pasture.

After the pooling plan was put into operation, the Herberts and the Padgetts found that they could not only do their own work easily but that they also had time to spare. According to Sloan, they took their tractors and machinery over to neighboring farms to help relieve labor conditions there, swapping machine hours for hours of hand labor.

Sloan says that this swap-work program is doing more than any other one thing to solve farm labor shortage problems in the State and he urges growers everywhere to cooperate with their neighbors in getting the necessary jobs done.

suitable substitutes when they are unable to find a dealer with tires designed expressly for their purpose, the OPA has announced. Dealers may also sell passenger car owners tire and tubes of a slightly different size than is called for by the rationing certificate.

Leather For Civilians
Manufacture of many civilian leather products, which was prohibited after June 1, can be continued through 1943 out of manufacturer's inventories, under a recent WPB amendment. Among products affected are dress gloves and mittens, brief cases, new upholstery, radio cases, pocketbooks, handbags, cigar and cigarette cases, key cases, tobacco pouches, watch straps and dog furnishings.

Gas Coupons Changed
A new "TT" gasoline coupon, which replaces the present "T" coupon, will become valid for use on July 1. The old type of "T" coupon will be invalid after July 25. OPA expects the change in design to help take up "slack" mileage and remove potential sources of black market gasoline.

AN ORDINANCE TO REGULATE PARKING ON THE STREETS OF HERTFORD:

1. It shall be unlawful for any automobile, truck, or motor vehicle of any kind, or any horse-drawn vehicle, to park on either side of that section of Church Street in the Town of Hertford, described as follows: There shall be no parking on that section of Church Street beginning at the intersection of Dobb Street, and ending at the Walter's Bridge.
2. Any person violating this ordinance shall be guilty of a misdemeanor, and upon conviction shall be assessed the cost of court and a fine of not less than \$5.00 nor more than \$50.00, or 30 days in jail, or both, in the discretion of the court.
3. This ordinance shall be in full force and effect after June 10, 1943.

NOTICE OF ELECTION OF SUPERVISORS TO BE HELD FOR ALBEMARLE SOIL CONSERVATION DISTRICT
To all occupiers of land lying within the boundaries of the Albemarle Soil Conservation District, notice is hereby given that between June 21st and 26th, 1943, an election will be held for the election of three supervisors for the Albemarle Soil Conservation District of the State of North Carolina.
All persons, firms and corporations

who hold title to, or are in possession of, any lands lying within the boundaries of the said district, whether as owners, lessees, renters, tenants, or otherwise, are eligible to vote at the said election. Only such persons, firms or corporations are eligible to vote.
Voting divisions and polling places for the election are as follows:

Eligible voters who will be absent from their division on the day of the election may apply in person or in writing to L. W. Anderson, Polling Superintendent, at Hertford, N. C., for absentee ballots. Each applicant for an absentee ballot shall state his name, residence, location and acreage of land owned or possessed, and interests therein.

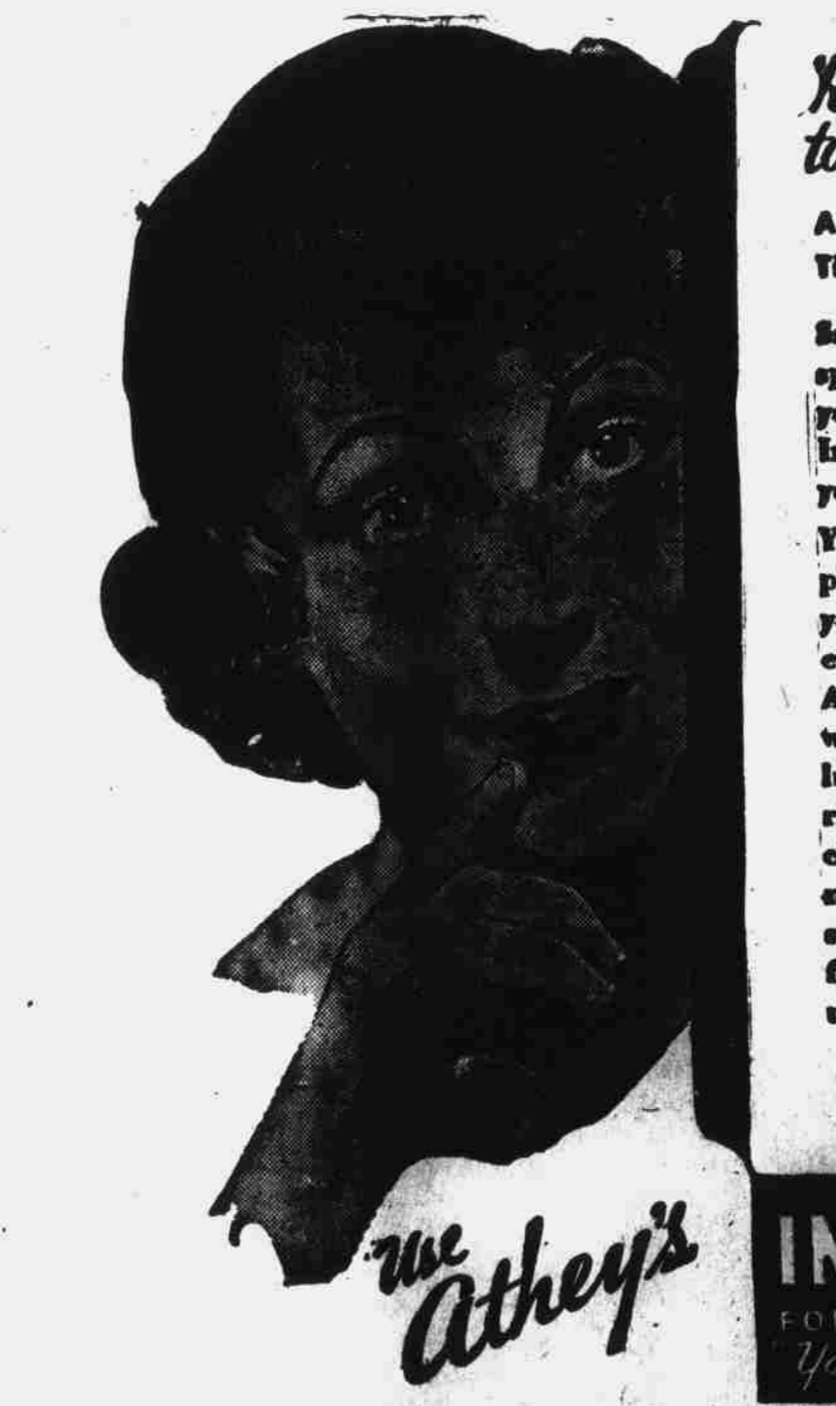
