#### Mussolini Ousted As Leader Of Italy

(Continued from Page One) nounced that Badoglio was conferring with Allied officials about peace terms, but according to Washington and London conditions had not yet reached this point.

Mid-week dispatches indicated disorder in some places within Italy, but to positions paying \$1,970 and \$1,752 seemingly the Fascist government has been completely overthrown and the new system installed. It was reported by an Italian source that the Fascist Grand Council, itself, outvoted Mussolini, foreing him to resign, after he had presented a plan to withdraw his armies from southern and middle Italy to a defense line in the north. Hitler had proposed this plan and Mussolini fell because he accepted the Nazi theory that Italy could not be defended.

Unconfirmed reports state Badoglio has ordered Italian troops, stationed in the Balkans and in France to return to the homeland. It is estimated there is some twenty-two

unless King Victor and Badoglio can perience or training requirements in salvage the government and withdraw from the war, a general uprising within Italy will cause a new government to be formed which will sue for peace with the Allies.

Replacements are needed frequent ly both in Federal departmental libraries, particularly in Washington, D. C., and in naval station libraries throughout the country. Library assistants in naval air and training stations will replace enlisted men going to sea. Libraries at these stations are for the use of enlisted men, and contain both technical and recreational reading matter.

Salaries given incorporate payment for the 8 hours of overtime included in the 48-hour Federal work-week. No specific experience or education is required to compete in the test, or to be eligible for appointment to the Authoritative sources believe that tions, persons must meet certain ex addition to passing the test.

There are no age limits for library assistant positions. The written test will include both general questions and items on elementary library methods.
