

## Town's Milk Supply Now Re-established

Hertford's milk supply, which was seriously curtailed for a week, has now been firmly re-established with the Elmwood Farms Dairy furnishing J. Oliver Hite, local milk distributor, with a large supply each day.

The dairy, following an inspection by the Perquimans Health Department officials last Friday, replaced its product on the local market on Saturday and it has been reported by the Health Department that the Elmwood Dairy is now a Grade A dairy and its products are so marked.

In addition to bringing the dairy buildings and machinery up to Grade A, the entire herd of cows at the dairy, it has been reported, was given tests by a veterinarian and the cows now being milked were passed as being satisfactory by him.

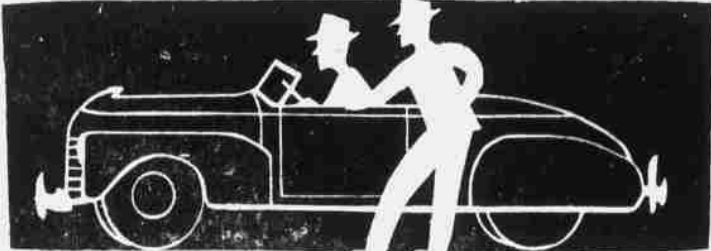
