

### Recorder's Judge Heard Five Cases Tuesday Morning

Five cases were disposed of in Perquimans Recorder's Court here Tuesday morning by Judge Charles Johnson, and due to the absence of Patrolman Charles Payne, who is on his vacation, five traffic cases were continued over until the next term of court.

Willie Jeanette, Negro, was given a 15-day suspended sentence for being guilty of assault and destruction of property. The sentence was suspended upon payment of court costs.

Elwood Q. White paid \$10 and costs, after pleading guilty to speeding.

William Bond was assessed the costs of court after entering a plea of guilty to speeding.

James Reeves plead guilty to speeding and paid a fine of \$10 and costs.

Judge Johnson found Oscar Green, not guilty in a case charging Oscar Green, James Green and Horace Reed, all Negroes, with assault with a deadly weapon. James Green plead guilty and the court found Reed guilty. Each was given a 30-day sentence, suspended upon payment of a fine of \$15 and costs.

### Stoves Will Be Rationed Beginning On August 24

The plan for nation-wide rationing of domestic heating and cooking stoves designed to burn coal, wood, oil or gas will go into effect at 12:01 a. m., August 24, the Office of Price Administration announced today. Beginning that date all consumer purchases of rationed stoves must be made with a certificate obtainable at a War Price and Rationing Board.

OPA also announced the complete time-table for instituting this new program and gave details of trade operations under the plan which supplants the present rationing of coal and wood heating stoves only in 32 states and the District of Columbia where fuel oil is rationed.
