

## Seed Available At County Agent's Office

Farmers who wish to plant crimson clover this fall can now get crimson clover seed through the Agricultural Conservation Association, in the Agricultural Building, Hertford. The supply is limited and farmers who want seed should apply for it at an early date. These seed come 150 pounds to the bag, and if anyone desires less than this quantity, he must bring a bag.

Best results will be secured if the seed are planted during September or early October. Dealers will have a supply of inoculation and the seed should be inoculated if planted on soil that has not produced a good growth of crimson clover in past years.

Crimson clover will help furnish feed this winter and help reduce the fertilizer bills next year, according to County Agent L. W. Anderson.
