W. Zachary Killed n Highway Accident **Last Thursday Night**

Funeral Service For **Hertford Dentist Con**ducted Sunday

Dr. John W. Zachary, 40, was instantly killed last Thursday night, at about eleven o'clock, when his automobile, which he was driving, overturned on the Harvey Point road about three miles south of Hertford.

Doctor Zachary was Hertford's only dentist, and he had been practicing here since February, 1936, when he replaced Dr. Luther Butler. He was a member of the Baptist Church, the Masonic Lodge, the Rotary Club, the American, State and District Dental Associations.

The entire community was shocked to learn of his death. He had attended a fish fry earlier in the even-

afternoon at 2 o'clock.

Surviving are his wife, Mrs. Gertrude Transou Zachary, and one daughter, Nancy.
