

Postmaster Advises Early Mailing To Insure Delivery

Joining in the appeal issued last week by Postmaster General Walker for people to do their Christmas mailing early this year, Silas M. Whedbee, Hertford postmaster, today issued a statement that patrons of the Hertford postoffice desiring assurance that their Christmas cards would be delivered locally during Christmas week, should place them in the mails not later than December 10th. Patrons are asked to hand them to one of the postoffice clerks and inform the clerk of the type of mail. The cards will then be worked and post marked and stacked for delivery the week before Christmas. Cards mailed during Christmas week, Mr. Whedbee stated, possibly might not be delivered until after Christmas, due to the heavy volume of mail expected to be handled here this year.

Patrons are also urged to mail out-of-town cards and packages not later than December 15th, to be sure of delivery before Christmas Day.
