

## Improvement Seen In Pulpwood Picture For Two Months

Some improvement in the pulpwood supply picture for 1943 is apparent in reports from pulp and paper mills for July and August. August deliveries were slightly more than seasonal over July, but still substantially below the 1942 and 1941 figures, A. B. Hansen, Deputy Director of the WPB Pulp and Paper Division, advised the Newspaper Pulpwood Committee this week.

It is too early yet to predict whether this trend will hold and gain momentum, Mr. Hansen said, but it is encouraging as a response to the current newspaper-industry victory pulpwood campaign created to induce farmers and small woodlot owners to engage in cutting pulpwood.

The most noticeable upswing is in the South, but encouraging trends were indicated in other sections of the pulpwood producing areas which include the Northeast, Appalachian and Lake States, and the Northwest regions.

"These facts should not lead to any kind of optimism," Mr. Hansen said. "At best they represent merely a change in trend in pulpwood production which was steadily downward for the first six months of this year. The July and August reversal might be compared to the conquests of Tunisia and Sicily. We've still got a whole war to win."

Mr. Hansen called attention to a report that more than 1000 communities in the 27 pulpwood producing states have organized local pulpwood committees and that in some towns business and professional men actually have gone into the woods and cut pulpwood in their spare time.

Despite the favorable reports in pulpwood receipts and inventories for July and August, Mr. Hansen warned that production must be stepped up consistently during the remainder of 1943 if the slump during the first six months is to be overcome.

He also stated that receipts of pulpwood at U. S. pulp mills showed a slight upswing in July, which trend continued in August. As a result, some mills were able to replenish partially depleted inventories. "Pulpwood production is still running far behind 1942, however," he concluded.

## Auto Licenses Go On Sale December 1st

Automobile license plates for 1944 will go on sale Wednesday, December 1, according to an announcement this week by the Carolina Motor Club, which has charge of sales.

License plates may be obtained by local motorists either in Edenton or Elizabeth City.

One large plate will be issued this year, instead of the small tab, such as was issued for 1943. The new plates will be black with yellow numerals, or the opposite color plan now used.
