

TOWN AND FARM IN WARTIME

GASOLINE—In 17 east coast states A-8 coupons are good through February 8th.

FUEL OIL—Period 1 coupons are good through January 3. Period 2 coupons became good November 30.

SUGAR—Stamp No. 29 in Book Four is good for 5 pounds through January 15.

SHOES—Stamp No. 18 in Book One, good for one pair. Stamp No. 1 on the "airplane" sheet in Book Three, good for one pair.

MEATS, FATS—Brown stamps G, H, J and K, good through December 4. Brown stamps L and M, good through January 1, 1944. Brown stamp N becomes good December 5 and remains good through January 1.

PROCESSED FOODS—Green stamps A, B and C in Book Four good through December 20. Green stamps D, E, and F in Book Four become good December 1 and remain good through January 20.

Civilians To Get Canned Foods

Increased supplies of canned pineapple, canned grapefruit juice, asparagus, corn pumpkin, spinach, tomatoes, beans, and fish will reach retail markets within a few weeks, the War Food Administration said recently. They are supplies owned and held by canners, but set aside for government purchase, which have been released to civilians.

More Farm Machinery In '44

An improved outlook for new farm machinery in 1944 is foreseen by the War Food Administration. Raw materials authorized by WPB to make planting, tillage, and harvesting equipment during the year provide for about twice the quantity produced in 1943, or almost 30 percent of the production in 1940—a year in which manufacture was relatively large. The manufacture of repair parts will be unrestricted.

Suspend Slaughter Quotas

To facilitate marketing and slaughter of record numbers of livestock produced by U. S. farmers, slaughter quotas (for civilian consumption) until further notice have been suspended by the War Food Administration.

Must Collect Points For Pork

Although WPA has temporarily lifted all its restrictions on the amount of pork a farmer may deliver to persons living off his farm, he must continue to collect ration points for all rationed meats, OPA said recently. If pork is transferred point-free, it means that a great deal of

this food will find its way into the black market and will be unavailable to legitimate consumers.

Brown Points For Waste Fats

For every pound of fat a housewife turns in to her meat dealer or other fat salvager, she will receive two "But most important," Herbert M. Faust, director of WPB's salvage division, said, "within a month the fat will be transformed into war materials and on the way to the fighting fronts." He reminded housewives to save the grease from turkeys, geese, ducks and chickens, for the manufacture of war products.

Reduce Bean Prices

Reductions up to two cents a pound in wholesale and retail prices for dry edible beans will result from recent OPA action reducing the price spread between country shipper and wholesaler. Country shipping point prices remain unchanged.

Wool Restrictions Lifted

With only two exceptions WPB has lifted all restrictions on use of raw wool. Other grades of alpaca may not be used except for military purposes, and only carpet wool and mohair may be used for floor coverings.

Fuel Oil Rationing State

Rations of fuel oil throughout the 33-state rationed area remain unchanged at 5.7 gallons per unit for Period 2, which began November 30. Chester Lewis, OPA administrator, said recently, Period 3 coupons, which also went into effect November 30 in the midwestern and southern states under fuel oil rationing, have the same unit value—10 gallons. This applies to Class 4 coupons, used mostly by small householders. Class 5 coupons, used by larger consumers, are good for 50 gallons each. Class 1 and 2 "change making" coupons for fuel oil, part of last year's ration, are invalid for all purposes beginning December 1.

Seed Potato Ceilings

Maximum prices for domestic and imported "certified" seed potatoes have been set by OPA at \$1 above established ceilings for U. S. No. 1 tablestock potatoes, and for "war-approved" seed potatoes at 50 cents above tablestock potatoes.

Can Hold Shoes 30 Days

Without ration payment dealers may not hold shoes bought on a will-call or lay-away plan, or by special order, longer than 30 days after they become available for delivery, OPA has announced.

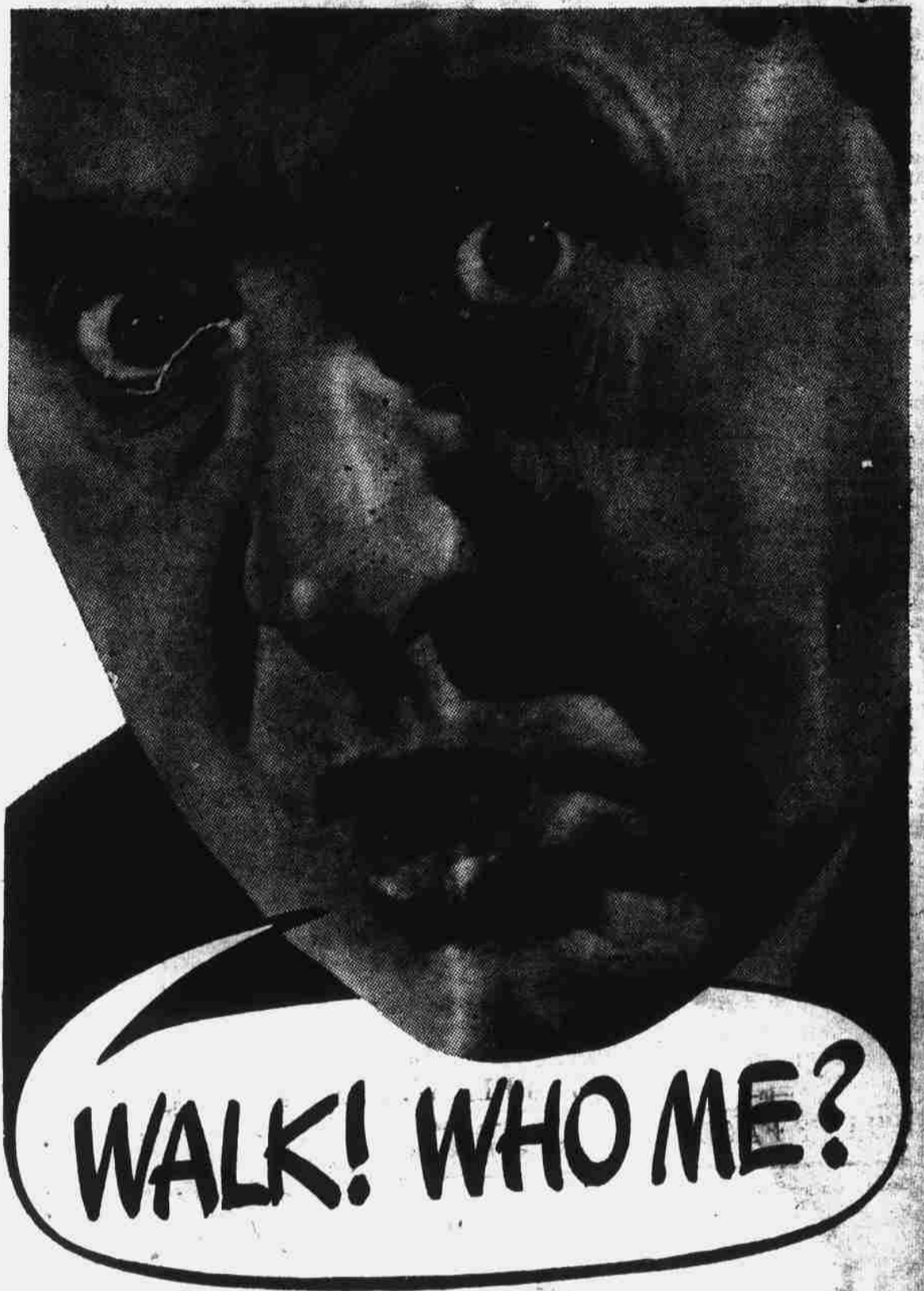

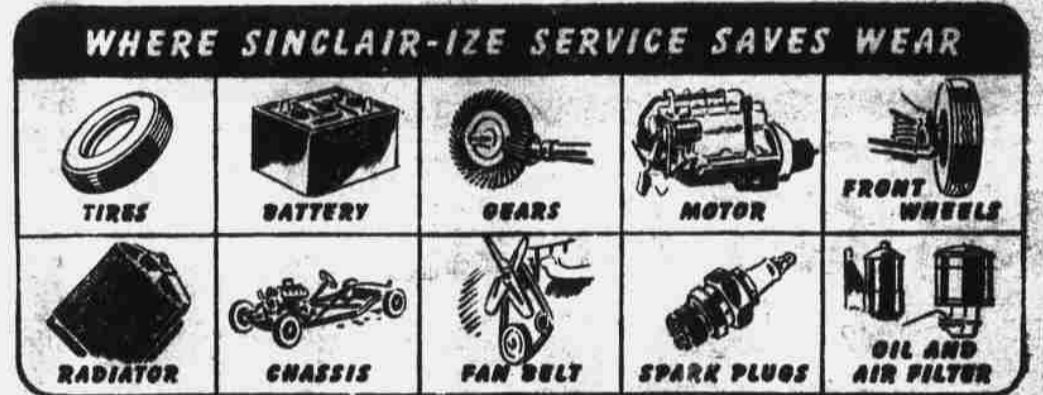

SUNDAY SCHOOL LESSON

THE SIN OF COVETOUSNESS

International Sunday School Lesson for December 5, 1943

GOLDEN TEXT: "Thou shalt not covet . . . anything that is thy neighbor's."—Exodus 20:17.

Lesson Text: Exodus 20:17; Luke 12:13-24.

The Tenth and last Commandment for our consideration in this series of lessons is, "Thou shalt not covet." This is a law against the sin which is probably the base of all sins, because out of it spring lying, deceit, murder, adultery, dishonesty, dishonor of parents, desecration of the Sabbath and even idolatry.

Just what is covetousness? According to the dictionary, it is the inordinate desire to possess, especially money. Its essential meaning is "to set the heart on" or, very literally, "to pant after."

The sin of covetousness is the greedy desire to possess something which belongs to another which so often ends in violent acts against another—oppression, cheating and even murder—in order to gain possession of the thing coveted.

This sin has been evident since the beginning of time. Eve, seeing the forbidden fruit hanging on the tree in the midst of the Garden of Eden, thought nothing also so desirable and, in order to possess it, disobeyed the command of God.

Cain coveted the favor of God that his brother Abel received. His covetousness generated insane jealousy which resulted in the murder of his brother.

Achan desired the beautiful Babylonian garment and the ingot of gold so much that he was willing to barter his honesty and his country's honor in order to obtain them.

David coveted Uriah's wife and, in order to possess her, had Uriah murdered. Ahab desired possession of the thriving vineyard of Naboth and his covetousness brought upon him the condemnation and wrath of God and a death like that of a dog.

Instances after instance of covetousness and its dire results is recorded in the Bible. This should serve as a warning to us, but, it doesn't.

Even in this fair land of ours, covetousness is a prevailing sin. The greedy desire to get, merely for the pleasure of getting, often times leads many to oppression, deception and even to murder.

Evil differentiated between the legitimate desire for wealth and the illegitimate desire which culminates in

covetousness, when he declared, "The desire for wealth is good as long as we have some use for the riches we acquire; it deteriorates into mere covetousness as soon as we crave to possess it for the sake of possessing it and apart from any use to which we propose to put it."

Covetousness deprives us of a most wonderful possession—contentment. The more we feed it, the more it demands. There probably never was a time in the history of the world when people and nations were so anxious to have everything everybody else has. If we could only get to the place where we could be satisfied with what we have and take time to be thankful for and enjoy that, we would be a more contented, restful people in a more peaceful world.

Covetousness is the cause of the upset condition of the world today. The greedy desire of nations to possess that which lawfully and rightfully belongs to another is the cause of much of the unrest which afflicts many of the nations of the world.

The terrible oppression of the Jews in Germany has as its basic cause the covetousness of governmental authorities for the material possessions accumulated by this race of people there. Apparently jealous of their ability and resourcefulness in acquiring wealth, the decision to dispossess them, with consequent oppression and persecution, inevitably followed.

Quick to condemn such flagrant acts of covetousness on the part of others, let us not forget that people make up nations and unless they themselves refrain from covetousness, national acts will reflect their personal attitudes.

The Bible does not condemn thrift nor the acquiring of wealth. Jesus never did so. However, he gave warning after warning against the putting of the accumulation of material possessions before the acquiring or laying up of spiritual possessions.

In our scripture reference for this lesson, he warned against covetousness, declaring, "For a man's life consisteth not in the abundance of the things which he possesseth." If we will remember to seek "first the Kingdom of God and His righteousness," all things material which are necessary to our well-being will be given us by the God whom we love and whom we endeavor to serve.
