

DPA Abolishes Tire Inspections April 20; Issue Permits

Compulsory periodic tire inspections for passenger cars will not be required after April 20, OPA officials have announced. In making public the end of the inspection program, it was declared that "this does not mean that the tire picture has become brighter. It simply means that the inspection program has fulfilled its objective . . . to make motorists conscious of the extreme need for tire conservation and tire care."

Motorists must continue to have an inspection made of passenger tires they wish to replace. This action does not affect truck tire inspections. Car owners must not destroy inspection records as they will be needed if a tire is to be replaced.
