

Furniture Dealer Gives Tip On Stoves

W. M. Morgan, Hertford furniture man, stated today that an article appearing in the Furniture Journal advises that homeowners in need of stoves should apply for certificates and order stoves as soon as possible, to insure delivery by next winter.

Mr. Morgan said that the article stated that the Government and stove manufacturers urge this action in view of the serious shortage of warehouse storage space. Most stove dealers now have their allotment of stoves for the next season and unless purchasers see these dealers immediately there may be some delay in obtaining stoves.

The article advises, Mr. Morgan added, that people who do not need stoves should not apply.

Government Use Tax Stamps Now Available

The Department of Internal Revenue has announced that auto use tax stamps in the denomination of \$4 have been placed on sale at all post offices and must be purchased and displayed on cars by July 1, 1944.

The postoffices will sell the stamps over the counter at the established price and no mail orders will be filled. Sale of the less than \$4 stamps in postoffices has been discontinued. Owners of cars who seek the use tax stamps of periods of less than one year must apply to the office of Internal Revenue.

The director stressed the fact that the use tax law has not been repealed and motorists who fail to display the stamp by July 1 are liable to court action and penalties.
