

New Bowling Alleys Drawing Sport Fans

Hertford's newest form of recreation, the bowling alleys which opened for the public recently, has had a large number of bowling fans enjoying the sport since the opening date, A. W. Hefren, co-owner of the alleys, stated this week.

Mr. Hefren and B. F. Ainsley, the owners, have four sets of alleys for the bowlers and each has been much in use since the opening. The alleys are well arranged and lighted and the building housing the alleys has been renovated into a fine room with plenty of space for spectators.
