

## Conservation Men Inspect Drainage In Bear Swamp

Dr. Buie of the Federal Soil Conservation Service, Washington, D. C., Mr. Carrier, head of the Soil Conservation Service for the State of Virginia, and E. B. Gault, Soil Conservationist for the State of North Carolina, spent Wednesday morning with the County Agent and District Soil Conservation field men looking over the Bear Swamp drainage project. The work completed so far is operating very nicely. The Bear Swamp Drainage District Commissioners still display an attitude of doing the district's portion of the work, but no definite move is under way.

Several farmers in the Bear Swamp Drainage area were visited and they report that the present drainage work completed thus far is very adequate and is solving the main drainage problem for those farms affected. Maximum drainage results will only be obtained where the farmers correctly cut their drainage systems

## Public Warned To Mail All Christmas Gifts In November

### Early Mailing Necessary to Be Delivered By Christmas

Due to unavoidable handicaps of war time conditions, the Postmaster General urges all Christmas gifts, for civilians and members of the armed forces who are still in this country be mailed during the month of November. There can be no assurance that gifts and cards mailed during the weeks immediately before Christmas will be delivered on time.

Transportation facilities are heavily burdened. The number of railway cars and airplanes, available for handling the mails, are far below that of former peacetime years. Facilities are just not available to transport and deliver the tremendous quantities of mail, formerly handled during the last three weeks before Christmas.

The public is, therefore, urged to do their Christmas mailing during the month of November, if they want the assurance of delivery by December 25.

"Mail your gifts during the month of November," urges Postmaster C. E. Kramer, "and mark packages 'Do Not Open Until Christmas!'"

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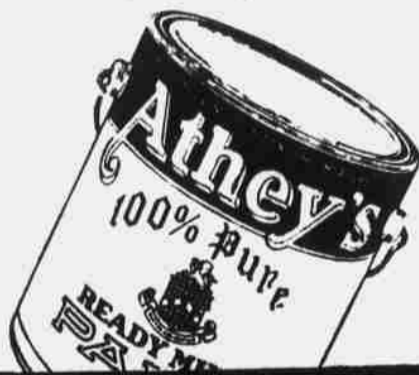
