There can be no assurance that gifts and cards mailed during the weeks immediately before Christmas will be delivered on time.

Transportation facilities are heavily burdened. The number of railway cars and airplanes, available for handling the mails, are far below that of former peacetime years. Facilities are just not available to transport and deliver the tremendous quantities of mail, formerly handled during the last three weeks before Christmas.


