

The Russian armies on the Eastern front continue to add to the pressure thrown against the Nazis. The Reds have moved into the outskirts of the Hungarian capital of Budapest, but heavy fighting is still reported in the section.

The mystery of the whereabouts of Hitler continues to deepen as reports lay no light on his state of health or his location. Some officials of London believe he has been thrown out as top man of the Nazis, and is either sick or hiding. High Nazi officials have made radio reports this week that Hitler is in excellent health, but is too busy to speak himself.

Reports from Europe say that the Reports from Europe say that the German morale is not as good as in recent months and that high Nazi officials have told German soldiers to shoot any one planning to surren-der. Hundreds of Germans Lave been deserting in recent weeks, go-ing over to the Allies, as the oppor-tunity presented itself.
