Belvidere Sergeant Decorated In Italy

With the Fifth Army, Italy—Master Sergeant Daugherty L. Stallings, 34, of Belvidere, North Carolina, recently was awarded the Bronze Star Medal for meritorious service in combat on the Fifth Army front during the Italian campaign.

He is a service section chief, field artillery battalion, with the 10th Mountain Division.

As non-commissioned officer in charge of ammunition, Stallings discharged his duties with speed and near perfection, stated the award citation. "Confronted with long and treacherous supply routes, many of which were harassed by dangerous enemy artillery fire, he labored diligently and steadily to insure that at no time would his battalion run short of ammunition.

He entered service in October, 1940. His mother, Mrs. Reubina Stallings, lives on Route 1, Belvidere.

Fuel Oil For Cooking And Hot Water

OIA District Director Theodore S. Johnson today advised householders in Eastern North Carolina who cook or heat water with oil, that they may now obtain fuel rations for use in their oil cooking stoves and hot water heaters, even though they have a coal or wood burning stove or furnace available.

The restrictions which formerly precluded fuel oil rationing for domestic cooking and for heating water where coal or wood burning stoves or furnaces were available, have been lifted for the period from May 1 to September 30, he explained.

"This does not mean that the fuel oil supply situation has eased", Johnson said, "but similar action was taken the past two summers, and the supply of fuel for civilians during the present heating season is about the same, or slightly less than it was then."

An exception to that rule is provision for direct sales to veterans who wish to buy surpluses to establish themselves in business, the professions or agriculture.

Increased Need For Nurses Seen
Victory in Europe has increased, rather than decreased the Army's need for nurses and will not affect the urgent requirements for recruits to the U. S. Cadet Nurse Corps, the Office of War Information announced. According to the Surgeon General, U. S. Army, the Army Nurse Corps today is 9,000 nurses short of its July 1, 1946, target.

Before July 1, 1946, there must be an increase in nursing strength in this country of nearly 14,000 nurses in the military and government services, and more than 35,000 for civilian needs, or a total of nearly 50,000

additional nurses, according to the Public Health Service. It is expected, however, that most of this need will be met by graduates from the U. S. Cadet Nurse Corps. It is anticipated that more than 30,000 student nurses will graduate between July 1, 1945, and July 1, 1946. To help meet these needs further, there is an immediate urgency for 10,000 new student nurses to fill Spring classes by June 30, and for an additional 60,000 new students during the period from July 1, 1945, to June 30, 1946, OWI was told.

Agricultural Information For Service Men and Veterans

In order to provide agricultural information to service men and veterans of this war who are interested in agriculture, the U. S. Department of Agriculture will place kits containing samples of available information in separation centers, hospitals, libraries and vocational guid-

ance and retraining centers of the Army, Navy, Air Forces and the Veterans Administration. These kits will be available for review in approximately 1,000 places in the continental U. S. and overseas. Accompanying each kit will be order blanks on which the veteran or service man can order by a simple check mark any item or group of items he may want. Among the material offered are several general publications designed to help the agriculturally inclined service man or veteran decide whether or not he really does want to become a farmer. In addition the kit contains 12 bulletins on subjects such as poultry raising, dairy farming, irrigation, farm house plans and conservation farming.
