**Deadline Extended Farm Slaughterers**

Farmers who had not applied for OPA slaughtering permits by last Saturday, June 30, will be granted an indefinite postponement of the deadline date, OPA District Director has announced.

Despite the postponement, however, Johnson urged all farmers who plan to slaughter and sell any amount of meat during the next year to apply for permits at their local War Price and Rationing Boards as early as possible, so that appropriate quota bases for slaughtering can be set.

**Recruitment For U. S. Cadet Nurse Corps Continues**

"The United States Cadet Nurse Corps must intensify its recruitment of student nurses for summer and fall classes to meet civilian health needs," Dr. Thomas Parran, Surgeon General of the Public Health Service, Federal Security Agency, said. Dr. Parran issued this statement in answer to inquiries about the effect on cadet nurse recruitment of the Army's announcement that it has enough nurses for the present to assure adequate care of sick and wounded soldiers. "To maintain the flow of senior cadets into Army service, it is imperative to keep recruitment at high levels," Dr. Parran explained. "Equally important, however, is the contribution cadet nurses have made in preventing the collapse of civilian nursing. We must continue to prepare nurses for needs in fields of nursing where the demand is expanding, especially the care of veterans." Dr. Parran characterized as completely unfounded rumors that recruitment for the Cadet Nurse Corps would be discontinued and called for support for the summer and fall recruitment drive now under way.

**Farmers To Get More Lumber To Repair Homes**

An additional 23,000,000 board feet of lumber has been allotted to the War Food Administration for distribution to farmers for emergency maintenance and repair of farm dwellings in the third quarter of 1945, WPB announced. Farmers make application for the lumber to the County Agricultural Conservation Committees, and approved applications are rated AA-3 by delegation of authority from WPB to WFA. Emergency cases for which applications will be approved are limited to repair of damage caused by fire, flood or similar disaster, or repair of dwellings that would be uninhabitable or a definite hazard to the health of the occupants if not repaired immediately, WPB said.

**Warranted Vehicle Dealers Need OPA Authorization To Sell**

To protect buyers who pay warranted prices for used passenger automobiles, trucks and motorcycles, OPA announced that only sellers who have adequate reconditioning and service facilities will be permitted to charge warranted prices after August 1. A warranted vehicle is a vehicle in good operating condition and carrying a written guarantee under which the seller agrees to make stated repairs at 50 per cent of his normal charges during the 30 days following sale or the first 1,000 miles of operation, whichever comes first. Forms upon which sellers may apply to OPA for permission to sell warranted vehicles are now available at War Price and Rationing Boards. On these applications sellers must supply OPA with information about their repair facilities or the facilities of their service suppliers. If they show facilities qualifying them to charge warranty prices, they will be sent an "authorization to sell" at warranted prices. No seller can charge these prices on and after August 1 unless he has an OPA authorization, which he must display in his place of business. Dealers denied authorizations by OPA district offices may appeal to regional administrators, and if denied by them, may appeal to the price administrator.

**OPA Postpones Auto Repair Regulation**

Effective date of the new regulation setting specific limits on the hours of labor that can be charged for on 56 common passenger car repair jobs has been postponed one month, until July 14, 1945, OPA announced. The regulation, originally announced as effective June 14, 1945, is designed to check a practice in some automobile repair shops of charging customers for more hours of labor than repairs actually require. OPA said that the postponement was requested by representatives of the trade who desired to have further consultations about the new provisions before they became effective.

**Consumer Prospects Today**

So that civilians may be assured of low and medium cost cotton clothing, OPA has revised the pricing methods of some types of garment manufacturers, this action to be effective June 25. Among the garments to be manufactured under the new regulation are women's, misses and children's dresses and blouses, sun suits, overalls and coveralls, and infants' dresses, creepers, rompers and crawlers. Vacuum cleaners now may be made again, WPB announced, but the continuing scarcity of textiles and other types of materials and components will prevent any appreciable production for several months. Enamelled wear will

not be produced in any great quantity for some time, due to difficulties in obtaining light-gauge steel sheets.

**Gasoline Rationing**

Changes affecting the eligibility of several groups of persons for gasoline rations were announced by OPA. They are as follows:

1. Service men returning to this

country from overseas, who are issued temporary duty orders for "rehabilitation, recuperation and recovery" may obtain furlough gasoline rations. These service men should apply to their local War Price and Rationing Boards and present both their temporary duty orders and the mileage rationing record (OPA

R-534) for the car that they are going to use. Previously, the ration was given only when service men on leave or furlough for three days or more presented leave or furlough papers. The change was necessary because those being sent home for periods of about 30 days will not be issued such papers.
