

ALLOWANCES MADE TO SELF-EMPLOYED VETS

 may apply for these any time within two years after his discharge or two years after the end of the war, whichever is the latter date (but not more than five years after the war has been declared over.) Of course, each veteran has to decide for himself when he comes home whether he wants to go to work right away and claim allowances till he gets set—either in a job or for himself—or whether he wants to let them stand as a reserve against a time he might need them more in months to come.
 Now what is meant by full self-employment in agriculture under the G. I. Bill? The case of each veteran is considered separately.
 The purpose of the G. I. Bill is clear in that it was meant to assist veterans who are attempting to set themselves up in business. The law specifies that an individual must be fully engaged in an independent operation for profit, and in addition, must be doing those things which are reasonably calculated to promote the success of his undertaking. The fact that a veteran devotes his full time to farming activities is not alone sufficient to qualify him as self-employed. A person may be employed on the farm in the same manner as he may be employed in a factory, working at all times under supervision, though the method of determining his compensation may differ. A per-

son working as an employee on the farm is not self-employed within the meaning of the law.
 It is estimated that out of 623 men in service from Perquimans County, that 324 are prospects for agriculture employment.

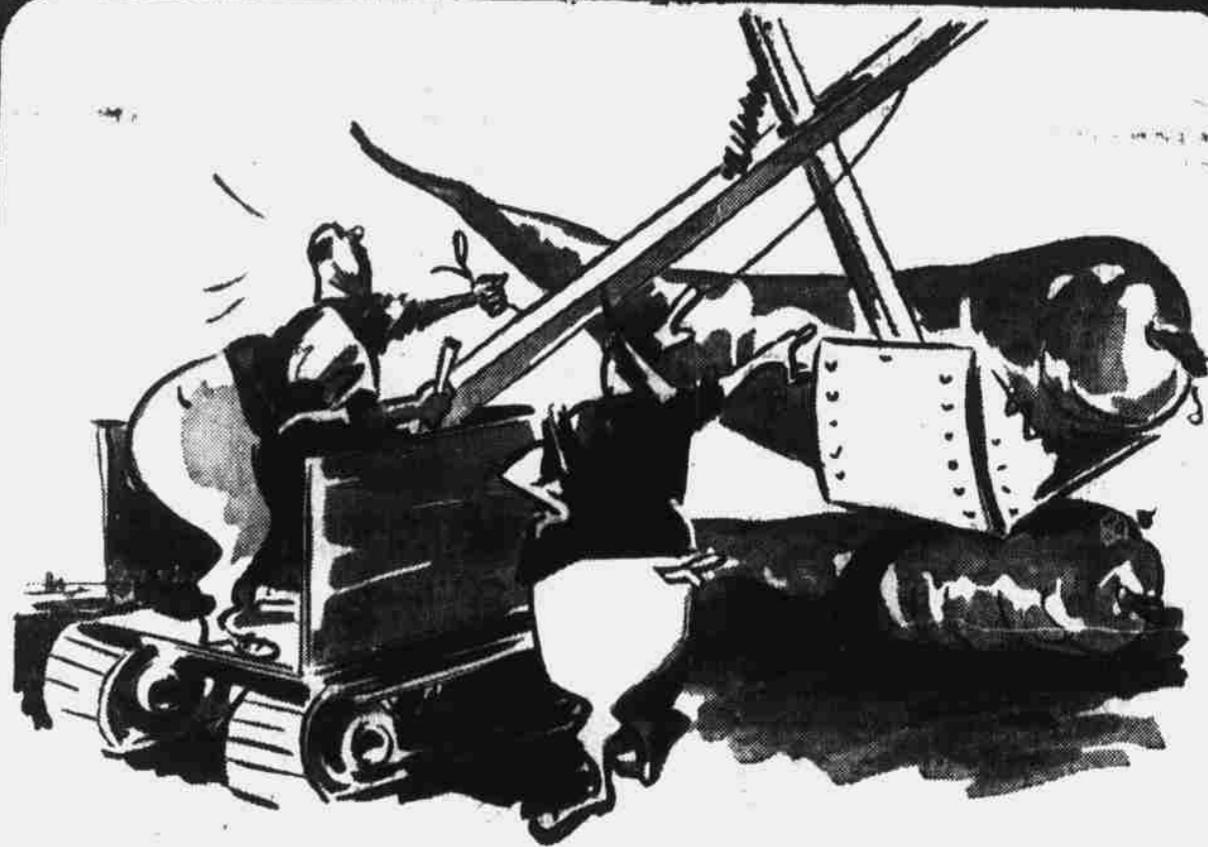
