D. Hiden Ramsey Is Seal Sale Chairman

D. Hiden Ramsey, prominent Asheville newspaper man, has been appointed chairman of the 1946 Christmas Seal Sale by the executive committee of the North Carolina Tuberculosis Association, according to an announcement by Frank W. Webster, executive secretary of the association. Ramsey succeeds Kemp D. Battle of Rocky Mount, who served as chairman in 1945.

Ramsey holds the Doctor of Laws degree from the University of North Carolina and at present is chairman of the State Planning Board and a member of the State Board of Education. He is general manager of the Asheville Citizen-Times Company and former president of the Asheville Chamber of Commerce, the North Carolina Conference of Social Service and the North Carolina Press Association.

In accepting the chairmanship of the Christmas Seal Sale, Ramsey stated that entirely too many North Carolinians are suffering and dying needlessly from tuberculosis in our State; that there is no justification for complacency among the people when over 1,400 persons died from the disease in the State last year.

Ramsey called upon the people to support the work of the North Carolina Tuberculosis Association in its drive for funds this fall. He stated that of all agencies rendering services of indispensable value in the fight against tuberculosis, the North Carolina Tuberculosis Association is the organization through which the average citizen can play his valuable role by enlisting his dimes and dollars in the battle against tuberculosis.

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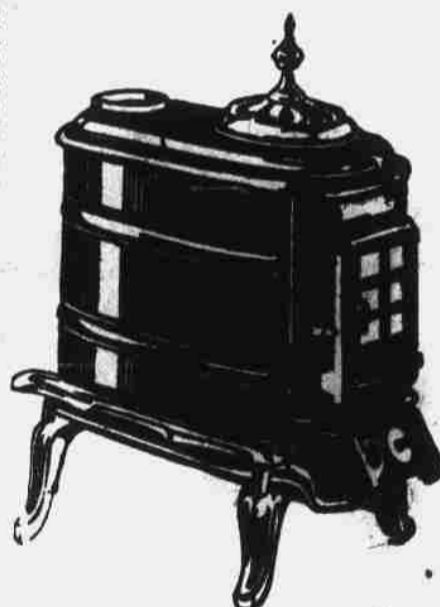
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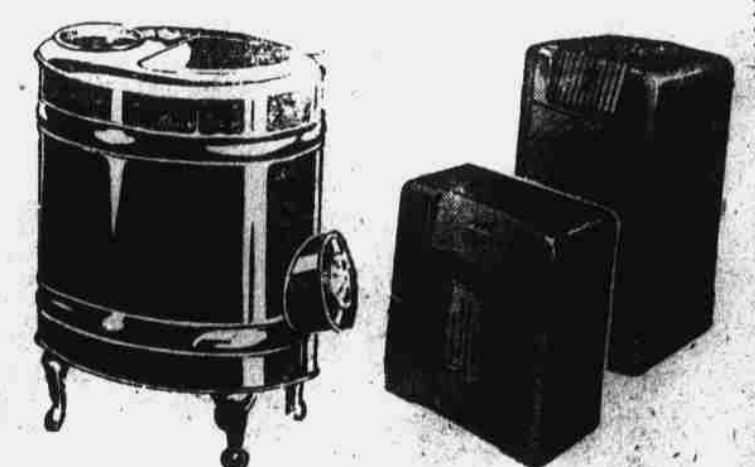
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
