The drive will continue until Indianapolis, Ind., a half sister, Mrs. Christmas eve and persons desiring Sally Hurdle of New Hope; a half to purchase the seals, and who do not receive any through the mails may obtain them through school children, also aiding the sales, or by calling Mrs. Davenport.

Seventy-five per cent of the money raised through the sale of the seals is retained here in this county to aid in combatting TB. Almost 1,000 Xray examinations have been made in Perquimans County during the past four years, and during this time 32 patients have been admitted to sanatorium.
