During the fiscal year, 404 new Rotary labs were organized in 12 countries of the Americas, and in Australia, Belgium, Burma, China, Czechoslovakia, Denmark, England, Federated Malay States, Finland, France, Greece, Hong Kong, India, Ireland, Luxembourg, New Zealand, Norway, Portugal, Straits Settlements, Sweden, The Netherlands, The Philippines and Wales.

To Seek Athletic **Director For School**

Youth Club Requests 12 Months Teacher and Coach

Representative of the Youth Committee of Perquinans County appeared before the Board of Education on Monday requesting the Superintendent of Schools be instructed to seek a full time teacher and athletic director for Perquimans High School, to assume the duties by the next school year.

The committee requested that funds amounting to at least \$2,500 be allotted as salary for the director, who the committee desires to be employed on a 12 months basis, this plan being Campaign For \$803 more desirable than the usual nine months term of a school teacher. In order to meet the salary requirement, the board of education was requested to obtain the approval of the plan a starting lineup for each by the board of county commissioners who in turn will appropriate a supplement in the salary over and above the State's pay for a teacher. This amount was estimated to be approximately \$85 per month.
