The action came as a surprise as most official Washington believed Byrnes would continue in the post for some time to come, but Mr. Byrnes stated doctors had advised him to slow down and he was unable to do this and retain the office. General Marshall is now enroute to Washington from China, where he has been on a presidential mission.
