### **Triple A Committee** Releases Report On Farmers' Benefits

Out For Agriculture In 1946 Program

A report released here this week by the Perquimans County AAA Committee revealed that a total of \$36,079.63 was paid out to local farmers as payment for participation in the 1946 AAA program. The report was made to the Board of County Commissioners at its meeting Monday.

According to the report, which omitted any reference to the permanent improvement to the farm lands of the county and which is the primary purpose of the program, out of the 946 farms in the county, 649 participated in the program last year. 126 of these farms received conservation materials in lieu of cash payment. the Perquimans County Hand Book,
