"If a bag of Tennessee 10 or Dixie 17 hybrid seed corn does not carry a state certification tag, it should be assumed that the seed could not be certified because of improper detasseling or handling, or because the seed so labeled is not as represented.

"It would, therefore, seem quite obvious that any of these hybrids sold as such without certification tags and the seal of a state certifying agency would be misbranded."


