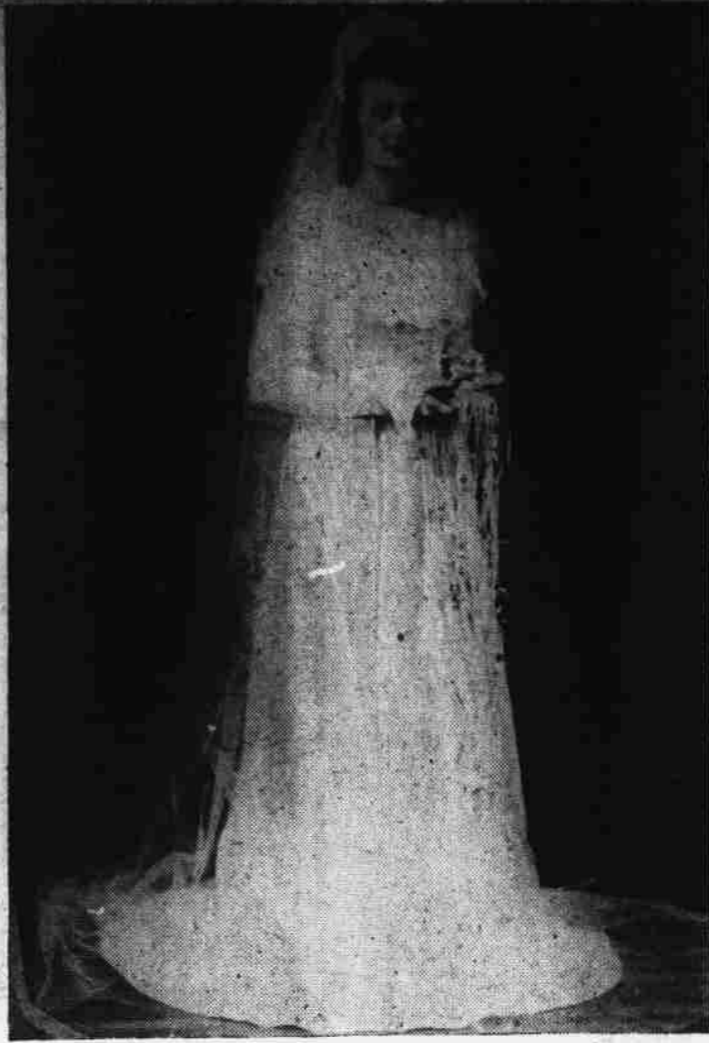

## Health and Beauty

After a case of sunburn, in most cases, the pigmentation is increased. After repeated sunnings most brunettes develop so much pigmentation that it protects them from sunburn. Sunburn really injures the skin. It sometimes permanently ruins its appearance. A writer on the subject says that "it is sometimes the forerunner of such diseases as piebald skin, and other skin disorders."

The bather, when unaccustomed to the direct rays of the sun, should protect the skin by applying creams, oils, ointments, or lotions which contain protective substances. These agents shield the skin from severe damage by absorbing ultra-violet radiation. Their action is not strong enough to prevent the evil effects of prolonged exposure to the sun but they materially alleviate them.

An application of an ointment of two per cent benzocaine will relieve the pain and swelling and hasten healing. Cold compresses of milk or oil are also soothing and helpful.

Some skins have a predisposition to skin cancer. This has been definitely proved. An authority says that there is "probably no certfact regarding the cause of cancer better established beyond question or doubt than that habitual exposure to sunlight causes cancer in certain types of skin under certain conditions." Persons with fair skins are more prone to skin cancer than those with a brunette skin.

Children in the tropics mature earlier than in cold or in temperate climates. This is due to the action of the sunlight in speeding up their

life cycle. The constantly exposed skin ages prematurely.

One-third of all skin cancers occur on the nose, an evidence of exposure to sunlight to which the nose is subject. The incidence of cancer is increased if moles, warts or other precancerous growths are not removed. General attention to the factors that favor the development of cancer of the skin will do much to decrease the death rate from such causes.

There are more than 3,000 deaths in the United States yearly from skin cancers. Most of these could be avoided or cured in the early stages. If you would be on the safe side and use preventive measures for avoiding skin cancers, do not habitually expose yourself to excessive sunshine. This is especially necessary if you are a thin-skinned blonde.

## Agriculture Proving Popular GI Study

Approximately 222,600 ex-servicemen—or one in nine World War II veterans training under the G. I. Bill—are learning some phase of agriculture, according to the Veterans Administration.

Of the veterans in schools and on-farm training program, VA said, 157,498 are learning general farming and related subjects; 56,048, farm management; 3,105 animal husbandry; 2,055, dairy husbandry; 1,795, horticulture; 1,342, agronomy and soil conservation; 1,170, agricultural engineering; 536, poultry husbandry; and 244, entomology.

About 90 per cent of these student-veterans are enrolled in institutional on-farm training courses which combine classroom instruction with practical farming. Veterans may apply for this type of training at their nearest VA office or Vocational Agricultural Club Meets.
