A Road Hazard

Perquimans County had its first highway death of the year last week when a young Kinston man lost his life as a result of an accident which occurred on the narrow strip of roadway which links Hertford with Route 17 beyond the by-pass to Winfall. This narrow roadway, known to residents of this community as the Causeway, is fast becoming a road hazard. With the increase in passenger and truck traffic of the past year more and more accidents are occurring in this county because of the condition of Route 17 at this point. Tourists and truckers, unfamiliar with the highway, have been victims of accidents while traveling through this part of the Albemarle.

A check of reports made by the State Highway Patrol will show that accidents have increased on the causeway by a goodly per cent. Most of these have been of minor nature, fortunately, but the fatal accident which happened last week should cause the State Highway Commission to look into this stretch of roadway and bring forth a decision to widen and straighten the short distance which will make this portion of Route 17 a safe highway.

Similar action has been taken by the Commission in making Route 17 a thoroughly safe roadway in other nearby counties. The Commission should not delay in completing the job. It should act immediately to relieve the condition as it exists here.

Blames 16-Year-Olds

Sixteen-year-old drivers are involved in three to nine times as many fatal automobile accidents as middle-aged drivers, according to the Automobile Safety Foundation.

In attempting to explain what the record shows, the Foundation says that research experts blame lack of driver-training, together with three characteristics of youth: (a) too much energy, which shows up in excessive speed; (b) inability to keep attention on driving, and (c) the tendency to "show off."

While the experts are probably correct in their analysis, we are inclined to believe that the average youngster is often the victim of over-confidence. Without adequate experience in the handling of motor vehicles, the young man or woman assumes an ability to meet any emergency that may arise. This confidence in one's ability is a valuable trait but, before it can be a positive asset, must be tempered with experience.

Victims Of Cooperation

It might be a good idea for those Americans who advocate cooperation with Russia to meet some "visitors" in Washington. We refer to:

1—Dr. George Dimitrov of Bulgaria, who helped the allies during the war and returned to Bulgaria to promote cooperation between the Communists and the Peasants. His intimate colleagues were executed and Mr. Dimitrov managed to escape with American help.

2—Ferenc Nagy, former Prime Minister of Hungary, who tried to cooperate with the Communists and with the Kremlin. His most active colleague was arrested and has never been released. Nagy managed to escape.

3—Dr. S. Manuila, former leader of the National-Peasant Party of Rumania, who walked across four borders to get out of his country after trying to work with the Communists. His chief colleagues are now serving life sentences in prison.

4—Dr. Vladko Madel, Croatian Peasant Party leader, who managed

to get out of his country as Marshal Tito came in. His colleague, who tried to work with Tito's Peoples' Front, is in prison.

What do these leaders of some of the peasant people of Europe report? They draw a grim picture of the situation to which Communist rulers have reduced peasants, asserting that the peasants are the chief victims of the so-called "Peoples' Regimes."

Important, If True

A specialist in Soviet economics reports that individual real wages in Russia declined about fifty per cent in the twenty years between 1928 and 1948.

The estimate has been made public by Dr. Solomon N. Schwarz and, if true, means that there is nothing whatever to the Communist threat to the economic stability of the capitalist system.

Dr. Schwarz calculated individual real wages on the basis of available wage data and the prices of the main food items but says that if prices on other consumer items are included, the general picture will be the same.

He points out that Russian workers make ends meet by increasing the number of bread-winners in a family unit. Moreover, he says the work week has been lengthened to 48 hours and that, in addition, the average wage or salary earner must work in his off time in things like gardening to supplement food supplies.

Wright Plane Comes Home

The small biplane in which Orville Wright made the first flight at Kitty Hawk, N. C., some forty-five years ago will occupy the place of honor at the Smithsonian Institute in Washington.

This is where it should have been all the time. The Wright brothers objected to the wording of a card which officials of the institution placed on the plane developed by Prof. Langley. It intimated that the professor had developed the first airplane.

Extracts From the Minutes of a Regular Meeting of the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Hertford, North Carolina, Held at 7:00 O'clock P. M., on April 12, 1948.

Mr. W. H. Hardcastle introduced the following bond ordinance which was read at length:

ORDINANCE AUTHORIZING \$3,300 WATER BONDS OF THE TOWN OF HERTFORD, NORTH CAROLINA, FOR REPAIRING WATER TANK

Be It Ordained by the Board of Commissioners of the Town of Hertford as follows:

Section 1. Pursuant to the Municipal Finance Act, 1921, of North Carolina, as amended, negotiable bonds of the Town of Hertford, North Carolina, are hereby authorized to be issued in an aggregate amount not exceeding \$3,300.00 for the purpose of repairing water tank (Water Department).

Section 2. A tax sufficient to pay the principal of and interest on said bonds shall be annually levied and collected.

Section 3. A statement of debt of the Town of Hertford has been filed with the Town Clerk and is open to public inspection.

Section 4. This ordinance shall take effect thirty days after its first publication unless in the meantime a petition for its submission to the voters is filed under the Municipal Finance Act, 1921, and in such event it shall take effect when approved by the voters of the Town of Hertford at an election as provided in said act.

The foregoing ordinance was passed on the 12th day of April, 1948, and was first published on the 11th day of June, 1948.

Any action or proceeding questioning the validity of said ordinance must be commenced within thirty days after its first publication.
