

### Loan Rates On 1948 Cotton Are Released Amounts Based Upon Staple Lengths and Grades

Government loan rates on the 1948 cotton crop have been announced, says C. W. Overman, county agent. A copy of these loan rates may be obtained at the county agricultural office.

Loan rates are based upon staple lengths and grades. Staple lengths in the loan table range from 15/16 inch to 1 1/4 inch. For instance, the loan rate on middling grade 15/16 inch staple is 31.37 and 1 1/4 inch, same grade, is 43.67 cents per pound. Therefore, the loan price on middling cotton will range from 31.37 to 43.61 cents per pound. The range in loan prices is as follows:

"As soon as your cotton is ginned, have your ginner or a certified sampler draw cut samples from your bales," says Mr. Overman. "Send these samples to the Board of Cotton Examiners, Raleigh, N. C. You will receive a class card showing the grade and staple of each bale thus sampled. On your loan table, check

the grade and staple for your cotton and you can determine the loan value. With this information you will be in a position to intelligently market your cotton or put it in Government Loan."

### Producers Of Certified Grain Seed Are Listed

Dr. R. P. Moore, director of the North Carolina Crop Improvement Association, announced this week that the 1948 list of small grain producers is ready for distribution.

Copies have been mailed to county agents, vocational agriculture teachers, seedsmen and other agricultural leaders and farmers. Additional copies may be obtained free by writing the Crop Improvement Association office, State College, Raleigh.

The total amount of small grain seed meeting requirements for certification is approximately 116,000 bushels, Dr. Moore said. The list of oat growers includes 37 producers of Fulgrain with approximately 34,000 bushels of seed; 34 producers of Victorgrain with 25,000 bushels; two producers of Lemont with 580 bushels; one producer of Lee with 150 bushels, and two producers of Stanton with 2,650 bushels of seed.

### Motorists Lagging In Inspection Of Autos

#### First Deadline Rapidly Approaching, Warns Officials

The Motor Vehicle Department warns North Carolina motorists that the first deadline for having vehicles inspected is fast drawing near.

The inspection regulations state that all motor vehicles of the year models up to and including 1936, and models 1947 and 1948 must be inspected on or before August 31.

The Department reported that most lanes have been doing a "rushing business" during the past few weeks taking care of vehicles in this group. Beginning with September 1, the lanes will start checking vehicles of year models 1937 and 1946. Models of these years must bear their approved stickers by September 30.

The Department has announced that the operation of any motor vehicle after its specified date of inspection will be a violation of the Motor Vehicle Laws, and state highway patrolmen have been instructed to give citations to any vehicle owner whose car or truck does not bear the sticker of approval by its specified deadline.

The regulations state that any vehicle may be presented for inspection at any time prior to the expiration of the time limit for that vehicle.

Deadlines for other model vehicles follow:

All models of the year 1938, 1939, 1943, 1944 and 1945 shall be inspected by October 31.

All models 1940 and 1942 shall be inspected by November 30.

All models of the years 1941 and 1949 shall be inspected by December 31.
