At the time of the accident, Copeland placed the location of the cutter time to fill out registration cards. at approximately 65 miles off the New Jersey coast near Cape May with a total of 140 crew members and trainees aboard.

Copeland said that the impact of the blow immediately set off an electrical fire which filled the ship with smoke, forcing everyone on deck before they were able to dress.

He stated that the crew fought fire intil the smoke cleared on the port passage way enabling them to obtain clothing from a foul weather gear locker and that they continued to st the fire until the fog began to nt at approximately 7 o'clock, at which time injured and dead crew numbers were carried by life boats to either the SS Suzanne or the SS Junior, two merchant ships that were , two merchant ships that were standing by, after which other crew members were transferred to ships were transferred to ships with the exception of 47 men, who remained aboard to aid two Coast Guard cutters that had arrived to help bring the fire under control.
