

### Graham Opposed To Road Bond Issue

January 1 after serving during the administration of Governor R. Gregg Cherry. He has opposed the Scott road plan ever since the present Governor announced it on the ground that it is "unwarranted and economically unsound."

"I shall cast my vote for the school building bond in Saturday's election, but I think it is unfair for proponents of the road bonds to tie their little red wagon to the school bonds," Graham added as he announced his support of the \$25,000,000 bond issue for construction and repair of school buildings.

After necessary deductions for administrative expense, debt service on bond issues floated for road purposes from 1921 to 1931, and for other expenses borne by the State highway

fund, Graham asserted that during the Cherry administration approximately \$191,000,000 was spent for construction and maintenance of the State's primary and secondary roads, with emphasis placed on the paving and improving of secondary roads. During the calendar year 1948, he added, 3,356 miles of roads were paved and of these 2,524 miles were rural roads.

Provided there is no "serious recession," Graham predicted the present administration will have approximately \$260,000,000 available for actual road work after necessary deductions are made for administrative, debt service and other items, or "just about -70,000,000 more than was available for actual road work during the Cherry administration."

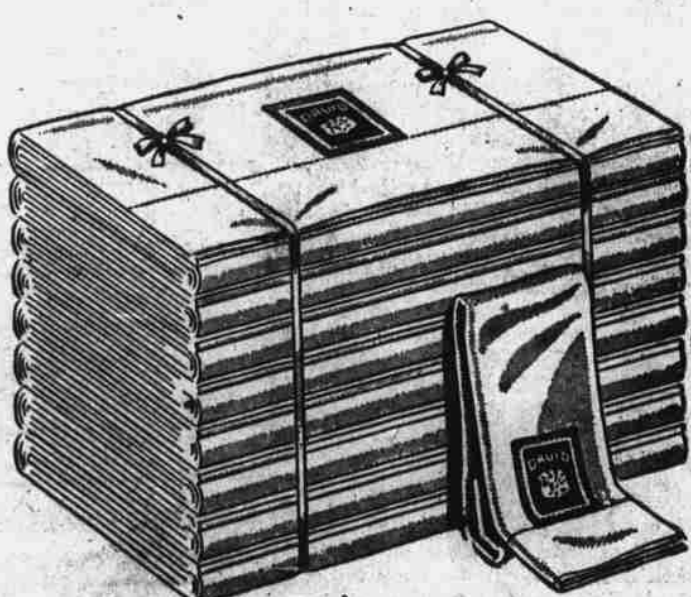
