# Diphtheria Clinic Every Saturday A. M.

Officials of the District Health De-partment today issued an appeal to parents to take steps to prevent diph theria among children of the State The Health Department pointed out that diphtheria occurs in most instances during the fall and winter months, and many cases are caused by carriers of Diphtheria Bacillus, who are children attending schools.

Parents are urged by Health Officials to have babies immunized against the disease and advises them to consult their family doctors for that purpose. The Department announced that parents unable to pay doctors for the service can have babies immunized at the local Health Department on Saturday mornings.

### POULTRY TIPS

cleaned and disinfected several days before the pullets are to be house A good disinfectant can be made of oz, of lye to each gallon of water

Some poultrymen have found it to be a good practice to move the pul-lets from the range to the Laying House at night time in order to disturb them as little as possible. In some cases the pullets have access to the yard around the Laying House when first brought from the range. The laying House should be well ventilated. Avoid crowding the pullets by allowing 31/2 to 4 square feet of floor space per bird.

Crunched corn cobs are gaining in popularity as a floor litter, but coarse shavings, peanut hulls, saw dust, etc., and the commercial litters are also used. Gradually build the floor litter up to 8 to 10 inches in depth, or preferably deeper. Then stir about once a week to prevent packing or matting together. Don't forget to keep plenty prevent cracked or broken eggs, and Mr. and Mrs. Will Burgess of Old to aid in producing cleaner eggs for

market. Select the more matured pullets to Rev. and Mrs. G. N. 

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
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
