Four Projects Set Up For County Total 16.7 Miles

The State Highway Commission's First District on Wednesday outlined its proposed secondary road program for the next two years.

The Division plans to hard-surface 360.5 miles of roads with bond money, 152.9 miles with betterment and federal aid funds and stabilize another 850 miles.

Highway Co.nmissioner Henry G. Shelton of Speed said the 513.4 miles of paving work represent about onehalf of the Division's pro-rate part of the 12,000 mile paving program planned for the State. Work is already in progress on some of the roads, and more will begin later this month.

First bond money mileage allotted to the Division's 14 counties is as follows:

Bertie, 29.4; Camden, 14.2; Chowan, 13.5; Currituck, 14; Dare, 10.7; Edgecombe, 44.2; Gates, 22.3; Halifax. 5.2; Hertford, 28.6; Martin, 27; Jorthampton, 34.4; Pasquotank, 15.3; erquimans, 16.7, and Warren, 35.
