

### Game Warden Gives New Hunting Dates

Eldon Winslow, Perquimans County Game Protector, today released dates for the hunting of rabbits and quail and the trapping of muskrat and opossum in this county. He stated that the season on rabbits and quail will open on November 24 and continue through January 31. Bag limits for rabbits are seven per day, 14 in possession, no season limit; for quail, eight per day, 16 in possession and 100 per season. Trapping season for mink, muskrat and opossum opens November 15 and continues through January 31.

Mr. Winslow also reported that the season for ducks and geese will open November 29 and continue through January 7. These may be hunted from one-half hour before sunrise to one hour before sunset. Bag limit for ducks is four, possession eight, while the limit for geese is two and possession two.

### Argument Ends With Lye In Eyes

Elmer Lee White, 30-year-old Negro, is a patient in the Chowan Hospital suffering possible loss of the sight in both eyes following an argument with his wife, Mary Alice, 19, last Sunday.

Sheriff M. G. Owens reported this

Later the wife told Sheriff Owens she threw the lye after her husband had thrown a knife at her. No charges have been placed against Mary Alice for the assault. White, it is reported, told Sheriff Owens he did not want to prosecute his wife for her actions.
