

## 125,000 Rural Youth In Southern States To Be 4-H Gardeners

### Youngsters Will Compete In National Garden Program

Now that they have received the signal—brightly colored seed catalogues—boys and girls in the Southern States are anxious to get started in becoming expert 4-H gardeners.

It is estimated that more than 125,000 of these rural youth in North Carolina and thirteen other Southern states will take part in the 1950 National 4-H Garden program. In it they will learn how to manage a well-planned garden, carry out a program of vegetable insect and disease control, and market produce in an economical and approved manner.

Through their garden project, they will increase individual and family incomes by reducing the amount of food purchased. They will also contribute to better family health by producing sufficient amounts of essential and nutritious vegetables and fruits for use throughout the year.

Incentives for outstanding achievements in gardening include gold-filled medals of honor for four county winners, and an all-expense trip to the Chicago 4-H Club Congress next November for the State champion, provided by Allis-Chalmers. Eight national winners selected from the state champions will each receive a \$300 college scholarship.

The 4-H Garden program is conducted under the direction of the Co-operative Extension Service. County Extension agents will furnish complete information.

Winners were named in 65 counties in this State last year.

## 19% Of Auto Drivers Fail To Get Renewal Of Driving Licenses

### 6,433 Licenses Are Disapproved In January Examinations

Nineteen per cent of applicants for driver's licenses failed to pass their examinations during January, the North Carolina Department of Motor Vehicles has reported.

A total of 31,250 applications were approved and 6,433 were disapproved. Road tests given numbered 24,508. Learners permits were issued to 11,083 persons. Operators' licenses issued totaled 27,085, duplicate licenses, 2,974, and chauffeurs licenses, 1,197. Revenue collected amounted to \$58,051.

Persons who had held licenses previously but did not obtain licenses under the issuance program failed for the reasons: Signs, 924; eyes, 489; rules, 1,029; road test, 686; equipment, 65; miscellaneous, 28. Persons applying for the first time failed to get licenses for the following reasons: signs, 659; eyes, 213; rules, 816; road test, 1,280; equipment, 58; miscellaneous, 11.

### Service Officer Has Bonus Forms

C. C. Banks, Perquimans County Veteran Service Officer, reported today that his office has on hand application forms for use in connection with the Pennsylvania State bonus for veterans.

Mr. Banks announced that any veteran now living in Perquimans County, who was a resident of Pennsylvania at the time he entered military service between December 7, 1941, and September 2, 1945, may be eligible for the bonus and if any veteran, believing himself eligible for the bonus, will apply at the County Service Office he will be assisted in filing the forms with the proper authority.

### Warrants Issued For Affray At Oak Point

Sheriff M. G. Owens reported today that warrants charging Alton Pierce with assault with a deadly weapon with intent to kill and Henry Mathews with assault with a deadly weapon had been served and the men are held on bond for appearance in Recorder's Court next Tuesday following an affray alleged to have occurred at Oak Point last Sunday morning at about 6:30 o'clock.

The Sheriff stated he learned that Mathews had been cut about the head and back and required medical attention following a fight at Oak Point which is owned by Mathews.

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### Town Purchases Lot To Enlarge Cemetery

Hertford's Town Board late last week completed arrangements for the purchase of a 50x210 foot lot adjoining the old portion of the town cemetery on King Street and will incorporate the land into the cemetery, it was announced by Mayor V. N. Darden.

The lot was purchased from Jesse Smith at a price reported as \$750. Arrangements to clear the lot and include it into the cemetery will start shortly, Mayor Darden stated.

### Objections Voiced Over Town Truck Lane

A proposal to establish a truck route through the Town of Hertford to relieve traffic congestion on Church Street, as presented to the Town Board last week has brought forth a number of objections from local citizens, according to a report made this week by a member of the Town Board.

This official stated that patrons of the Hertford Grammar School have voiced objections to the proposal that a truck route be established on Grubb Street, because of the proximity of the heavy traffic to the school zone.

**MINUTES OF MEETING BOARD OF EDUCATION**  
The Board of Education met in a special session Wednesday, February 15, 1950, at 7:30 P. M. All members were present. Chairman J. A. White presided.

The building committee was invited to attend this meeting. The following were present: A. W. Hefren and Max Campbell.

The chairman stated that the purpose of this meeting was to consider the recommendation of the Division of Surveys as to location of a union colored school in Perquimans County. The recommendation is as follows: "Upon completion it is the recommendation of this Division that the new union colored school for Perquimans County be located at Wintail and that the existing site in Hertford be the location of an elementary colored school."

After due consideration and discussion a motion was made, duly seconded, and unanimously passed, that the Board of Education accept the recommendation of the Division of Surveys.

The Board of Education passed a resolution recommending that plans, bids, and construction of both projects be carried out simultaneously.

The Board gave approval of construction of cement play area at Hertford Grammar School.

The Board accepted the resignation of Mrs. Tom Skippy as teacher in

Perquimans County High School. The Board approved the election of Mrs. Silas Whedbee, subject to her acceptance, to fill the unexpired term of Mrs. Skippy.

The Board approved a list of substitute teachers as submitted by principals.

They reluctantly accepted the resignation of Mrs. Alice Futrell as a member of the Perquimans County Board of Education.

In tendering her resignation, Mrs. Futrell stated that she had enjoyed working with the Board for educational advancement in Perquimans County and would miss the business and professional contact enjoyed at every

Board meeting, however, she felt that other circumstances outweighed this pleasure and responsibility.

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### Vets' Question Box

Q. I want to reinstate my National Service Life Insurance convert policy that I allowed to lapse about eight months ago. Will I have to pay for the medical examination with the reinstatement application?

A. If you desire to reinstate your NSLI, you may upon application receive a physical examination free of charge at any VA field office having medical facilities.

Q. Is there a provision that allows monthly income payments to disabled National Service Life Insurance policyholders?

A. A provision may be added to NSLI policies on application of the insured which provides payments of \$5 per month for each \$1,000 of insurance in force. The insured pays a small additional premium to have this protection.
