Truman Will Run In 1952

From now until 1952, there will be periodical efforts on the part of reporters and political commentators to get a reply from President Truman as to whether he will be a candidate for re-election in 1952.

The net result of the questioning, of course, will be exactly nothing. The President, as a good politician, will not disclose his hand this early in the game. This will not deter the ambitious reporters from seeking to make some copy by discussing the question, backward and forward, at periodic intervals between now and the early part of 1952.

The President may not be willing to commit himself but there is nothing in evidence to suggest that he does not intend to run again in 1952. In fact, there is every reason to believe that Mr. Truman, following his surprise victory of 1948, likes the job of being President and will chart his course on the well-known slogan, "Few die and none resign" from public office.

Over-Estimating The Reds

J. Edgar Hoover, head of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, has appealed to Congress to add 700 persons to his staff, half for investigative work and the other half for clerical work.

In view of the necessity to protect, if possible, the atomic and hydrogen secrets of the nation, the FBI probably needs additional men unless it can eliminate some of the investigative work now being carried on.

In connection with his successful appeal to a Senate group, Mr. Hoover reported that there are 54,000 card-holding members of the Communist Party in the United States. He estimated that there are roughly ten times that number of fellow-travelers,

or Communist sympathizers. We do not know how the FBI chief arrived at the figure of 54,000 Communists but we have no idea that his estimate as to "fellow-travelers" is accurate.

There has been a tendency in the United States to call any liberal a "fellow-traveler" and to use the term as an epithet, applicable to one's opponent, whether the argument dealt with political, social or religious matters. If everybody to whom the epithet has been applied in the past few years is to be considered a "fellow-traveler," there must be at least fifty million in the country.
