## Leaflet Is Issued On Lettuce Growing

A new four-page leaflet covering all phases of lettuce growing was published this week by the State College Extension Service. Issued as Extension Circular No. 349, it is entitled "Growing Lettuce in North Carolina."

The publication was prepared by J. M. Jenkins, Jr., research professor of horticulture, and H. M. Covington, horticulturist. It is intended to be useful to home gardeners as well as to commercial growers.

Subjects discussed include soils and fertilizer, varieties, growing the

plants, use of pelleted seed, control of damping off disease, field spacing, cultivation, irrigation, harvesting and packing.

Lettuce is grown commercially in the southeastern part of the State and to a limited extent in the Piedmont and the mountains. It may be grown as a home garden vegetable in all parts of the State.

Copies of "Growing Lettuce in North Carolina" may be obtained free from the local county agent or by writing the Agricultural Editor, State College Station, Raleigh.
