Improper distribution of load will have the same effect on the frame, axles, springs and tires. The National Safety Council make the following additional suggest for safe operation of farm trucks.

Know the signs and rules of the road and always obey them. Keep lights, brakes, steering me-chanism, and windshield wipers in perfect working order.
Slow to a safe speed for turns and

use proper signals.

Be on the lookoult for pedestrians.

Never drive while under the influence of alcohol.

Come to a full stop when entering a main highway, at railroads, or at regular stop signs, and do not pro-ceed until it is safe to do so.
